


Cumberland Gap

"Arrived December 8, after a severe march through heavy snow and rain. While at Cumberland Gap made two marches into Kentucky about 30 miles to secure supplies. On the first one made during Christmas week into Harlan County, we brought out 86 beef cattle. The regiment is well drilled, well armed and would be very efficient if we had plenty of clothing and shoes."

"... took command in person and the rebels hearing that they were down there on that business marched from Cumberland Gap to Cumberland River near Mt. Pleasant in order to cut them off and capture their arms and clothing. The number of rebels were 400. They retreated back to the Gap taking with them 85 head of beef cattle."
