Dinosaur National Monument





Hiking is a great way to experience the monument's intriguing history and rugged scenery. Before you begin any hike, be prepared for changing conditions in the desert environment. Most trails are exposed to full sun. In the summer, bring at least one liter of water per person for each hour hiking. Sturdy hiking shoes are recommended on all trails. Elevations vary across Dinosaur National Monument, ranging from 4,700 feet at river level near the Quarry Visitor Center to over 8,000 feet.

For overnight or extended backpacking trips, stop by any monument visitor center for a free permit. Maps and trail guides are available for purchase. Pets are allowed only on designated pet friendly trails and are not allowed in the backcountry.

Quarry Visitor Center & Cub Creek Road (Utah)

Tilted layers of rock characterize this area of the monument. This is also the best place to see dinosaur fossils. While the Fossil Discovery Trail is the most popular hike for good reason, several other trails allow you to discover Josie Morris's cabin, secluded box canyons, and numerous petroglyphs and pictographs.

E. Lizard Petroglyphs	Stop 14 along Cub Creek Road	0.34 mi 0.55 <i>km</i>	moderate (short but steep)	numerous petroglyphs, including several lizard figures
F. Box Canyon	End of Cub Creek Road	0.25 mi 0.4 <i>km</i>	easy	shady box canyon once used as a natural animal corral by Josie Morris
G. Hog Canyon	End of Cub Creek Road	1.5 mi 2.4 <i>km</i>	easy	scenic, partly shaded canyon with spring-fed creek. Watch out for poison ivy!

Canyon Visitor Center & Harpers Corner Road (Colorado)

Harpers Corner Road is the gateway to Dinosaur National Monument's canyon county. The trails in this area offer a look at desert shrub communities and outstanding views into the Uinta Basin and Green and Yampa river canyons. Pets on a leash are allowed only on designated trails.

In addition to these trails, Dinosaur has a vast backcountry to explore. Off-trail hiking is permitted in most areas of the monument. Always follow Leave No Trace principles.
