

OLD VICTORIA'S HISTORY

In 1899, the Victoria Copper Mining Company quickly built 20 log cabins on the hill below the mine to rent to the men needed to work the mine.

Inside, one room with a ladder to a loft served as home to a miner and his family and often a few boarders.

As the years passed, the company remodeled most of the log cabins, adding stone foundations, chimneys and interior improvements.

Waves of miners, many immigrants, lived in these company-owned log cabins, paying rent to the company who paid their wages.


The mine closed in 1921, and the miners and their families moved away. The mine buildings were sold for scrap or fell down. The log cabins were left behind to be reclaimed by the wilderness from



which they came.





The Victoria Mine, after 1916, from left to right: shaft house, steam plant, company store, captains house, big boarding house, and company office.

RESTORATION

After being abandoned for over 50 years, restoration of the old Victoria cabins began in 1973, funded by a small grant and private donations. Old Victoria opened as a museum on July 4, 1976.

The restoration site is owned and operated by the Society for the Restoration of Old Victoria, a small non-profit volunteer group. Funding is provided by tour fees, donations, fund raisers and member dues.
