# Environmental Education in the National Park Service

NEED/NESA/NEEL/Environmental Living



Environmental Education is a part of our lives that is here to stay.

Since the recognition of the need for environmental education about a decade ago, we have come to understand that henceforth it will be a necessary component of our society if our planet is to continue as a home for people and many other forms of life.

What, exactly, is Environmental Education?
. . . It is the process of learning and teaching, at the

conscious level, that man is an interacting part of nature, and is as subject to all natural laws and their endless interactions as any other organism.

It encompasses the facts and concepts of all academic disciplines—but only when these are taught and learned within a context of the overriding fact that any single action any individual takes has an uncountable number of impacts.

## NEED

Through the National Environmental Education Development (NEED) Program, curriculum-integrating materials have been produced for school grades kindergarten through eight. Students learn through these that nothing is static; everything is always in a state of movement and change. NEED is a multidisciplinary program. It uses the Strands Conceptual Approach which emphasizes the concepts of Similarity/Variety; Patterns; Interrelationships/Interdependence; Continuity/Change; Ad-

aptation/Evolution.

Presented as a whole the Strands become a systems approach in environmental education. They can be used to teach, interpret, or systematically explore any facet of our environments. NEED aims to deepen conscious awareness of all environments within children. It hopes to expand that awareness to understanding, then to commitment to values that enhance our planet's overall quality of life.

The materials produced are a Teacher's Resource Guide and photoduplicating pack for grades K-2; Teacher Guides, Student Classroom Books, and Student Outdoor Books for grades 3-6; and a series of four videotape filmstrips for grades 7 and 8.\* These were developed by the National Park Service under the sponsorship of the National Park Foundation.

### NESA

National Environmental Study Areas (NESAs) are natural or cultural sites (varying from a plot of school land to a city dump or archaeological excavation) with high potential for, and active programs in, environmental education. Usually, the schools and/or parks involved with these sites develop study guide materials which aid students in understanding the processes and dynamics to be found there, and help them to relate the area's resources to people's use of them.

Persons connected with environmental study areas who

wish them to become National Environmental Study Areas may request application forms from the National Park Service, which will evaluate the resources and programs for conformance to the agency's NESA criteria.

A document entitled National Environmental Study Area: A Guide\*\* has been written to explain this program further and to offer encouraging know-how to teachers and resource managers who are interested in establishing a NESA.
