1991 SUMMER SCHEDULE

Nez Perce National Historical Park, with 24 separate sites scattered across the Idaho countryside, commemorates the legends, history, and lifeways of the Nez Perce people. The park also gives recogni-

tion to the explorers, fur traders, missionaries, settlers, gold miners, farmers, loggers, and soldiers who moved through or into this area.

FACILITIES

The park Visitor Center is located at Spalding, Idaho, twelve miles east of Lewiston, Idaho, on Highway 95. The visitor center features exhibits of Nez Perce historical items, several audiovisual programs, and a sales

outlet for books, postcards, slides, beading kits and other items. Beadwork, earrings, necklaces, bags, and woven cornhusk items, handmade by local Nez Perce artisans, are also displayed for sale.

HOURS

Open daily except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years Day. From Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day, the visitor center is open from

8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and picnic area hours are 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Admission is free.

SUMMER PROGRAMS

Interpretive programs and special events are offered from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. These are a must for those interested in learning more about Nez Perce culture, both past and present.

Slide & Film Presentations

View a five-minute slide presentation about Nez Perce legends and the vision quest entitled "Nez Perce Heritage." Also available is a 23-minute movie entitled "Nez Perce: Portrait of a People." Both are an excellent introduction to Nez Perce history and culture.

Daily: Shown upon request in the visitor center auditorium.

Afternoon Talks

Join a ranger for a talk on various aspects of Nez Perce culture and history. Daily: 1:00 p.m. at the visitor center.

Tipi Pitching

Help put up a tipi and learn about tipi life in the Nez Perce country. Daily: 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at the visitor center.

Evening Programs

Enjoy a quiet picnic by the river and join a ranger for historical walks, talks, demonstrations, and more. <u>East Kamiah Site:</u> Thursday evenings, June 20-Sept. 5, 7:30 p.m. <u>Spalding Site:</u> Wednesday evenings, June 12,26; July 10,24;

WHITE BIRD BATTLEFIELD	Tour the area where the first battle of the Nez Perce War of 1877 was fought. Located 12 miles south of Grange-ville. Auto tour brochures	are available at the park visitor center in Spalding, and at the beginning of the auto tour.
HEART OF THE MONSTER	View the place of creation according to Nez Perce legend. Located 1 mile south of Kamiah. An interpretive	shelter and audio station at the end of a short paved walkway tell the legend of coyote and the monster.
ACCOMMODATIONS	Food and lodging are available in Lewiston, Orofino, Kamiah, Grangeville, Lowell, and Kooskia in Idaho, Clarkston in Washington. Restaurants, grocery stores, and service stations can be found throughout the region. Camping facilities are available in Lewiston at Hells Gate State Park, at Chief Timothy State Park in Clarkston, and at Winchester Lake State Park in Winchester, Idaho.
