FORT CONCHO

A frontier army post from 1867-1889, Fort Concho is a historic preservation project and museum which is owned and operated by the City of San Angelo, Texas. Established along the banks of the Concho River, Fort Concho was built to protect frontier settlements, map the vast West Texas region, and quell hostile threats. Famous military commanders such as Randal Mackenzie, Benjamin Grierson, and William 'Pecos Bill' Shafter served here. A number of cavalry and infantry units, including all four regiments of the Buffalo Soldiers were stationed at the post. Today, Fort Concho National Historic Landmark encompasses most of the former army post and includes twenty-three original and restored fort structures. Authentically refurbished exhibit buildings include a restored Headquarters, Soldiers' Barracks and Mess Hall, Officers' Quarters, Chapel/Schoolhouse, and the Post Hospital. View America's vibrant and unique frontier past at Fort Concho, one of the best preserved forts of the Indian Wars Era (1866-1891).
