


North Cascades Scenic Highway

POINTS OF INTEREST

Early Winters Information Station: National Forest and Area information. Exhibits. Books and maps for sale.

Washington Pass: Highest point on highway. Picnic area and scenic overlook. Information booth, books and maps. Overlook trail accessible to people with disabilities.

Rainy Pass: Picnic area, day hikes. Trail to Rainy Lake accessible to people with disabilities. Pacific Crest Trail crosses highway here.



Picnics

Picnicking is allowed in campgrounds, however the camping fee applies for this use.

Washington Pass: Shaded picnic sites with tables. Restrooms. Short, paved loop trail to overlook accessible to people with disabilities.

Rainy Pass: Picnic sites with tables and some shade. Restrooms. Day hikes to Rainy Lake and Lake Ann.

Canyon Creek: (Junction of Granite and Canyon Creeks). Undeveloped area with room for walk-in picnicking.

Camping

Camping or fires are not allowed within 1/4 mile of the highway except in developed campgrounds. No camping at Rainy Pass. Stay limit in most of the campgrounds is five days.

Early Winters Campground: (Both sides of highway). 13 units/outhouses/running water/garbage service. Near stream and highway. Fee charged.

Klipchuck Campground: (1 mile off highway). 46 units/flush toilets/running water/garbage service. Best for large vehicles. Good tent sites. Near stream. Fee charged.

Lone Fir Campground: 27 units/outhouses/running water/garbage service. Located along Early Winters Creek near Cutthroat Lake trailhead. Good overnight spot for bicyclists. Fee charged.

Hiking

Because of soil and plant damage from heavy use, camping is not allowed within 1/4 mile of Cutthroat Lake, Rainy Lake, Blue Lake or Lake Ann.

Cedar Creek: 9 miles to Abernathy Pass, fairly level with steep climb last 1.2 miles. Double falls at 2 miles. Follows creek for most of length.

Cutthroat Creek: Mostly level 1.7 mile walk to Cutthroat Lake, followed by a continuous 3.8 mile climb (1800') to Cutthroat Pass, where it joins the Pacific Crest Trail. Excellent views from the pass.

Blue Lake: 1100' climb in 2.2 miles to a very scenic lake in a small rock-walled basin.

Rainy Lake: Easy, paved 1 mile trail suitable for people with disabilities. Observation platform at lake with views of glacier waterfall.

Lake Ann: Moderate (700') 2 mile climb to lake via short side trail. Main trail leads past lake to Heather Pass and Maple Pass above. Good views and wildflowers.

Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail: Well maintained route leading from Rainy Pass north to Hart's Pass and Canada, south to Mexico.

Easy Pass: Strenuous 2800' climb (5.1 miles) to very scenic, high pass bordering North Cascades National Park. Views of glaciers and rugged peaks. No camping at pass.

Chancellor Trail: Trail runs along narrow, steep-walled valley and scenic Canyon Creek. Limited campsites. Chancellor ghost town at 9 miles.

More To Do

Fishing: Fishing is allowed in most streams and lakes, but not in Ruby Creek. All State fishing regulations apply, including license requirements. Rainbow/Cutthroat trout.

Berry Picking: Huckleberries can be found in open areas along the highway in late summer and fall. Salmonberries, thimbleberries and elderberries occasionally discovered in places.

Mountaineering: Popular climbs for experienced mountaineers include Silver Star, Whistler, Crater Mountain and Black Peak. Cutthroat Peak, Liberty Bell Mountain and Early Wintes Spires are possible technical climbs.
