Using museum property collections that derived from archaeological investigations of the Wallace Bottom Site (3AR179) between 1998 and 2006, Dr. John House identified an "archaeological signature" of the Quapaw in the 17th and 18th century White River watershed. The archaeological site, which is located on White River National Wildlife Refuge in Arkansas County, Arkansas, is the best candidate for the Quapaw village of Osotouy and the French Arkansas Post. House's article "Native American Material Culture from the Wallace Bottom Site, Southeastern Arkansas" will appear in Volume 32(1) of *Southeastern Archaeology*. SAA Launches New Research Journal

"Current Research," a news section in American Antiquity, established in 1962, has transitioned to an online format. The mission of *Current Research Online* (CRO) is to bring greater awareness of current field, lab, and collections work being conducted by archaeologists around the world in a timely, clear, and concise manner that is accessible to archeologists and the public through the Society of American Archaeology web portal. CRO aims to become a comprehensive, online, database driven search application for global archeological research. CRO will be updated semi-annually, with an attractive, easy-to-use, and interactive user interface offering professional quality reporting output.

The online relational database management system currently in place allows for various management operations, including submissions, review by regional coordinators, data storage, text and spatial search functions, and formatted output, among other tools. Database entries are currently organized among 20 world regions, each with a Regional Coordinator to manage submissions. While submissions to CRO are a privilege of SAA membership, the resource is open to the public to search.

Archeological Resources Protection Training Program—The Federal Law

Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) presents this thirty-seven hour class which provides training in all aspects of an archeological investigation and subsequent prosecution of the crimes. This premier class is taught by accomplished instructors that are nationally recognized subject matter experts in the fields of law enforcement, archeology and law. The class cumulates in a twelve-hour archeological crime scene practical exercise where law enforcement officers and archeologist work as a team to investigate and document a crime scene. Attendees will gather and process physical evidence, write incident reports, executive summaries, search warrants, damage assessments, and provide testimony in a courtroom scenario.

This 37-hour course is taught by accomplished instructors who are nationally-recognized subject matter experts in the fields of law enforcement, archeology and law. Enrollment is limited to federal or state law enforcement officers, archeologists and prosecutors.

March 25-28, 2014. Access to Parks and Outdoor Recreation Areas. Hot Springs National Park. \$595. This 3 ½ -day training course will provide an overview of the accessibility standards while emphasizing a universal design approach for new construction and alterations to existing facilities. This course is ideal for planners, designers, facility managers and accessibility coordinators. Upon completion of the course, learners will be able to: apply the accessibility standards to new construction and altered recreation facilities; direct project supervision to ensure compliance with the accessibility standards; and apply universal design concepts to benefit the widest spectrum of park users.

The Facility Manager Leaders Program course of study is designed to develop and strengthen the knowledge and competencies of selected employees through a year-long education and training program that proactively builds capabilities in asset management, operations and maintenance, project management, resource stewardship, business management, supervision and leadership. New facility managers, first line supervisors, and any other permanent employee ready to take the next career step into a chief of maintenance position are encouraged to apply. NPS Offers Archeological Prospection Workshop

The NPS 2014 workshop on archeological prospection techniques, Current Archeological Prospection Advances for Non-Destructive Investigations in the 21st Century, will be held May 19-23, 2014, at Aztalan State Park, in Jefferson County, Wisconsin. Lodging and lectures will be at the Comfort Suites in Johnson Creek, Wisconsin. The field exercises will take place at Aztalan State Park.

Aztalan State Park is a National Historic Landmark and showcases an ancient Middle Mississippian village that thrived between A.D. 1000 and 1300. The people who settled Aztalan built large, flat-topped pyramidal mounds and a stockade around their village. Portions of the stockade and two mounds have been reconstructed

in the park. Co-sponsors for the workshop include the NPS Midwest Archeological Center, Aztalan State Park, and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

This will be the twenty-fourth year of the workshop dedicated to the use of geophysical, aerial photography and other remote sensing methods as they apply to the identification, evaluation, conservation, and protection of archeological resources. The workshop will present lectures on the theory of operation, methodology, processing, and interpretation with on-hands use of the equipment in the field.
