Welcome

Welcome to Pathfinder National Wildlife Refuge (NWR), located in central Wyoming. The Refuge consists of 16,806 non-contiguous acres in four parcels and includes mixed-grass uplands and wetland habitats. The wetlands provide welcome resting, nesting and feeding areas for migrating waterfowl, especially in springtime.

General Information

To access Pathfinder NWR from Casper, WY, take WY-220 west for 50 miles. From Rawlins, take US 287 north for 44 miles, then turn east on WY 220 for 21 miles.

Hunting and fishing are permitted on this Refuge in accordance with Federal and State regulations. Additional Refuge-specific regulations are necessary to protect wildlife and habitat, as well as provide a safe experience for hunters, anglers, and Refuge staff. Please familiarize yourself with the following information to help ensure a safe and enjoyable visit.

Dogs are to be restrained except while engaged in a hunting activity.

Prohibited Activities

- Camping or fires.
- Off-road vehicles.
- Cleaning of birds on the Refuge.
- Littering, including spent shells.
- Collecting or removing artifacts, historic items, shed antlers, and other natural objects.
- Cutting, gathering, manipulating, or bringing in any vegetation to create a blind.

Firearms

Persons possessing, transporting, or carrying firearms on National Wildlife Refuge System lands must comply with all provisions of State and local law. Persons may only use



Hours

Hunters and anglers may enter the Refuge 1 hour before legal sunrise and must exit the Refuge by 1 hour after legal sunset. Legal sunrise and sunset times can be found in the Wyoming Game and Fish Hunting Regulations.

Big Game Hunting

The Refuge is open to hunting big game in designated areas, following State regulations and Refuge-specific regulations. Species include mule deer, pronghorn antelope and white-tailed deer.

Upland Game Hunting

The Refuge is open to hunting upland game in designated areas following State regulations and specific Refuge regulations. Species include hare and rabbit.

Migratory Game Bird Hunting

The Refuge is open to hunting migratory game birds following State regulations and Refuge-specific regulations. Species include coot, dark geese, ducks, grouse, light geese, and mourning dove.

Fishing

Fishing is permitted at Pathfinder NWR on the main reservoir and in stream areas leading to it, per State seasons and regulations.
