A very special gift shop operated by a nonprofit volunteer association features a variety of environmental books, gifts, and educational materials.



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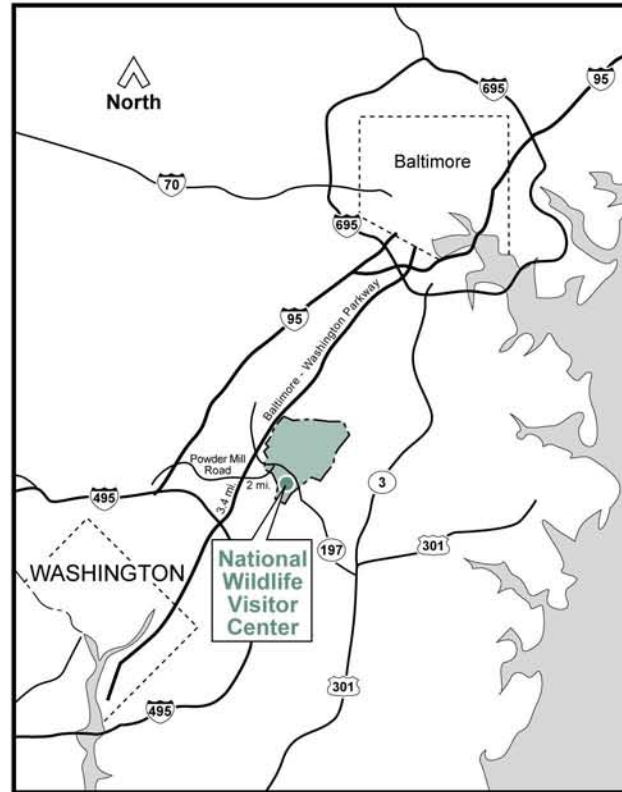

*the largest science and environmental education center in the Department of the Interior. This unique U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service facility is located on the 12,750 acre Patuxent Research Refuge. The Visitor Center is designed to provide visitors with knowledge and appreciation of the role of wildlife research in preserving the earth's vital resources. Interactive exhibits focus on global environmental issues, migratory bird routes, wildlife habitats, and endangered species recovery efforts. Surrounding forests, lakes and trails provide opportunities for wildlife-oriented recreation, educational programs and group tours.*



#### Location

In the heart of the Baltimore-Washington corridor, the National Wildlife Visitor Center is located off of Powder Mill Road, 2 miles east of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, just south of Laurel, Maryland.

#### Hours

9:00 A.M. - 4:30 P.M. every day. Closed on Federal Holidays.

#### Admission Cost

All exhibits are free to the general public. Guided tram tours are available seasonally for a nominal fee.

#### School Groups

School classes are encouraged, but must schedule in advance. A teacher orientation workshop is required prior to bringing classes. No food or concession areas are provided.
