Stone Lakes National Wildlife Refuge is one of the newest additions to the vast National Wildlife Refuge System. Its wetlands, riparian areas, and grasslands sustain a rich array of fish, wildlife, and plants.

Introduction

Stone Lakes NWR

The diverse habitats of Stone Lakes National Wildlife Refuge are home to over 200 species of birds and numerous other fish and wildlife species. The refuge is located in the heart of California's Central Valley along the Pacific Flyway. When combined with neighboring natural areas, it is part of a vast landscape corridor that serves as a sanctuary for many resident and migratory fish, wildlife, and plant species.

Wetland, Riparian, and Grassland Habitats Existing and newly created wetlands are a focal point for many Pacific Flyway migrants. Waterfowl, shorebirds, and wading birds rest and feed on mudflats, wetlands, and lakes. Some wetland species, such as mallards, black-necked stilts, and pied-billed grebes, remain to breed.

Valley oaks, cottonwoods, and willows form lush riparian corridors along creeks, lakes, and waterways. These riparian zones support active egret, heron, and cormorant rookeries. Woodlands also support migratory forest-dependent birds, such as Wilson's warblers, and resident mammals, such as opossums, raccoons, and skunks.

Grassy uplands provide habitat for coyotes, western meadowlarks, and rodents. The skies above are patrolled by more than 15 species of birds of prey, ranging from great horned owls to Swainson's hawks.



Enjoy the Refuge's Wildlife

Wildlife observation is becoming increasingly popular across the nation. You will be most successful if you use binoculars or a spotting scope, go alone or in a small group, and move quietly. Please observe animals from a distance. You are a guest in their home. Many species are secretive, so you may only see signs of their presence. Best viewing times are in the morning and late afternoon, as refuge visiting hours permit.


Throughout the year you will see a rich variety of wildlife on the refuge. This checklist documents 213 bird species and 24 other wildlife species within the Stone Lakes NWR project boundary. It is a work in progress and will be revised from time to time. We encourage birders to report their observations, especially unusual birds, to the refuge headquarters.


