

What is a National Heritage Corridor?

With the first National Heritage Area designated in 1984, a new idea for community-led conservation, heritage preservation and economic development was born. As President Ronald Reagan designated the first area in Illinois, he called the National Heritage Area program "a new kind of national park."



Moving forward to 1994, The Last Green Valley National Heritage Corridor was designated and signed into existence by President Bill Clinton as only the 4th heritage area in the nation. Our Heritage Corridor redefined the entire program, having been conceived and willed into existence by a large group of passionate residents representing history, agriculture, the waterways, forests and economic development. Their passion and persistence changed how Congress defined a National Heritage Corridor, leaving its management in the hands of the community. It's fitting that local determination was the most important factor in the region's designation. This land has shaped a history and forged a community of trailblazers since the first Indigenous Peoples walked this region and that spirit is still at the heart of The Last Green Valley.

The Last Green Valley, Inc. (TLGV) is the non-profit created by those residents to carry on the work of the Heritage Corridor and ensure what made this region worthy of being an area of national significance remains. Today there are 55 National Heritage Areas throughout the country.


Water Quality Monitoring

The 35 towns and cities of The Last Green Valley National Heritage Corridor each have adventures to offer and unique and interesting stories to tell. Together they are an extraordinary region tied together by the waters, forests, farms, history and people.



9 MASSACHUSETTS TOWNS

Brimfield (1731) (brimfieldma.org): Known for its huge annual antiques show, held 3 times a year, you can enjoy award-winning, locally-made wines, ciders and beers after a day of outdoor adventures in Brimfield State Forest. Hike, fish, hunt and snowmobile or paddle across East Brimfield Lake, part of the Quinebaug River National Recreation Water Trail.

Charlton (1755) (townofcharlton.net): Visit the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Buffumville Lake for year-round fun and programs or visit the 86-acre Capen Hill Nature Sanctuary with trails and Visitor Center with live animal exhibits. Scenic views abound from Charlton's hilltops and July means a blueberry festival in town.

Dudley (1731) (dudleyma.gov): History and hiking are easy to find here. The Black Tavern hosts programs year-round, and The Dudley Conservation Land Trust has conserved almost 350 acres and has miles of trails to explore. You'll also find plenty to do at the Pearle L. Crawford Library, a state-of-the-art facility where you will be greeted by friendly faces and tons of programs for all ages. Don't miss the annual strawberry festival.

East Brookfield (1920) (eastbrookfieldma. us): The northernmost town in The Last Green Valley and the youngest town in the Commonwealth, East Brookfield is known as the "baby town of the Commonwealth." Home to baseball legend Connie Mack, the center of town hugs beautiful Lake Lashaway. You'll find plenty of fresh air in East Brookfield.

Holland (1783) (town.holland.ma.us): If you love the water, Holland is for you. Lake Siog has it all in every season — swimming, scuba diving, paddling and fishing (on the ice too) beckon you. There is also a competitive water ski team, a vibrant community center and trails for miles of hikes, runs, bikes and snowshoeing.

Oxford (1713) (oxfordma.us): History and the outdoors are abundant in Oxford. A Firefighter's Museum, an abandoned Huguenot Fort and the Clara Barton Birthplace Museum entice explorers with a historical interest. Enjoy the outdoors as the Mid-State Trail passes through town and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Hodges Village Dam offers paddling, hiking and much more.

Southbridge (1816) (ci.southbridge.ma.us): One of the "cities" of The Last Green Valley, Southbridge's industrial revolution past is alive in its architecture and museums. Learn how Southbridge became "The Eve of the Commonwealth" at the Optical Heritage Museum, dine in the downtown restaurants, hit the trails or paddle the Quinebaug River all within easy reach of the heart of downtown. You'll find a stop on The Last Green Valley letterboxing trail here too.

Sturbridge (1738) (sturbridge.gov): History and nature come together in Sturbridge. Old Sturbridge Village brings history to life and an active trail system keeps you moving so you can enjoy all the wonderful dining options guilt-free. You'll also find luxury lodging, camping and more for a trip to remember.

Webster (1832) (webster-ma.gov): Home to Lake Chargoggagoggmanchauggagoggchaubunagungamaugg, the largest natural lake in southern New England (1,442 acres), Webster welcomes boaters, fishermen and bald eagles. The French River flows through town and there is an active hunting and fishing community. It's also home of the new Samuel Slater Experience, a local book store, a stop on The Last Green Valley letterboxing trail and so much more!

26 CONNECTICUT TOWNS

Ashford (1714) (ashfordtownhall.org): You can enter the land of the pixies in Ashford if you trek on the blue-blazed Nipmuck Trail to Pixies Falls in Nipmuck State Forest. Or tackle miles of trails on Joshua's Trust properties before stopping at an orchard for some locally crafted spirits or attending a program at Horizon Wings, a non-profit wildlife rehabilitation center specializing in birds of prey.

Brooklyn (1786) (brooklynct.org): Brooklyn's center is iconic New England with the entire district on the Register of National Historic Places. Visit the Brooklyn Historical Society Museum & Daniel Putnam Tyler Law Office while visiting the town center. New paddlers will also love Riverside Park canoe/kavak launch. which is easy to find and has great parking.

Canterbury (1703) (canterburyct.org): Enjoy a scenic drive on National Scenic Byway Rt. 169 through the heart of town. You'll see many buildings on the National Register of Historic Places, including the home of the Connecticut State Heroine, Prudence Crandall. You can also paddle the Ouinebaug River with two launches in town.

Chaplin (1822) (chaplinct.org): A place steeped in legend and beautiful in every season, Diana's Pool is one of the many extraordinary stops along the Natchaug River that calls to campers & fishermen year after year. You can also find history throughout town and the amazing blue-blazed Natchaug Trail in Natchaug State Forest.

Coventry (1711) (coventryct.org): The western most town in the Heritage Corridor, State Hero Nathan Hale called Coventry home. The Hale Homestead is a CT Landmarks site and home to one of southern New England's largest farmers markets, The Coventry Farmer's Market, Hale State Forest is also a popular place to walk and mountain bike.

Eastford (1847) (eastfordct.org): Jump on the blue-blazed Nipmuck Trail on Westford Rd. and you'll be walking on part of the Old Connecticut Path, a trail blazed by the Indigenous People of the region long before the colonists came to town. If ancient cemeteries pique your interest start with Phoenixville Cemetery where Civil War hero Nathaniel Lyon is laid to rest. You can then hike the blue-blazed Natchaug Trail to the ruins of his old homestead.

Franklin (1716) (franklinct.com): The seven rolling hills of Franklin shape the town's landscape and history. The people of Franklin have a rich history and deep roots, the descendants of the town's first settler still living on the land 10 generations later. You'll find beautiful vistas and trails through still wild land. Visit the Ashbel Woodward Museum to learn more about this guiet and beautiful town. Griswold (1815) (griswold-ct.org): Spend the day or camp and spend a week at Hopeville Pond State Park, where you can picnic, paddle, hike, bike, swim and fish. You'll find plenty of spots in town to fuel up with a hearty breakfast, lunch or dinner. The town's active Recreation Department hosts events many times a year and if you prefer your adventure off a trail you can check out the skate park.

Hampton (1786) (hamptonct.org): A historic town center has wonderful architecture but not a single stop light. The Air Line State Park Trail and Goodwin State Forest will give you plenty of reasons to stop and enjoy the scenery. Or take a walk in the footsteps of naturalist and author Edwin Way Teale at Connecticut Audubon's Trailwood, Teale's home that he donated to the non-profit.

Killingly (1708) (killingly.org): Killingly has something for everyone — a historic downtown, shopping, dining, parks, rural areas, the Quinebaug River and year–round events thanks to an active business association, town staff and volunteers. Home to one of the best locations to watch the sunrise, you'll also find one of the locations on The Last Green Valley's letterboxing trail in town too.

Lebanon (1700) (lebanonct.gov): The iconic Lebanon Town Green is the home of history, a vibrant farmer's market, wonderful antiques sale and much more. Want to stand where George Washington did? You can in Lebanon. The Historical Society Museum & Visitors Center offers engaging displays and hands-on activities for the whole family and there are several other historic sites lining the green to visit. You'll also find one of the locations on The Last Green Valley's letterboxing trail in town too.

Lisbon (1786) (lisbonct.com): National Scenic Byway Rt. 169 goes right down the middle of town. With the Shetucket River to the west and the Quinebaug River to the east, the views are indeed scenic. Lisbon's trails bring together its bountiful natural world and its historic places, such as Burnham Tavern.

Mansfield/Storrs (1702) (mansfieldct.gov): The home of UConn and its rich cultural and historical venues, there's plenty to do, buy, eat and drink in Storrs. Mansfield Hollow State Park and Mansfield Hollow Dam, one of six Army Corps properties in the Heritage Corridor, offer the opportunity to get away from all the action. The town's commitment to open space also ensures a trail is never far away.

Norwich (1659) (norwichct.org): The oldest city in The Last Green Valley, the history of the nation, from the early relationships between Indigenous people and the colonists to the American and Industrial Revolutions, can be told in Norwich. The home of Benedict Arnold and Samuel Huntington, Norwich's history is alive through its regular historic tours and its architecturally stunning downtown. You'll find dining from around the world and a harbor where the bald eagles soar.

Plainfield (1699) (plainfieldct.org):
Rochambeau's troops camped here for four
days in 1781 on their way to meet George
Washington and the town has been a place
for travelers ever since. The East Coast
Greenway and Quinebaug River National
Recreation Water Trail pass through Plainfield,
and there are several sites on the WashingtonRochambeau National Trail here as well.

Pomfret (1713) (pomfretct.gov): The legend of Israel Putnam and the last wolf in CT happened in Pomfret before the Revolutionary War. Today wildlife finds a haven in Pomfret thanks to the CT Audubon Society's Bafflin Sanctuary, land trust properties, the Air Line State Park Trail and Mashamoquet Brook State Park. The town has also developed new mountain biking trails on one of its properties.

Preston (1686) (preston-ct.org): On the southern-most tip of The Last Green Valley, Preston is bounded by Poquetanuck Cove and the Quinebaug and Shetucket Rivers, providing important food sources and habitat for bald eagles. Of course this means great bird watching, fishing and paddling opportunities are available to you too.

Putnam (1855) (putnamct.us): A destination downtown offers unique shops, dining, entertainment and perhaps one of the most photographed waterfalls in all of Southern New England. The town and businesses work together to provide year-round events, closing Main Street for pedestrian-friendly celebrations or filling the banks of the Quinebaug River in Rotary Park with music.

Scotland (1857) (scotlandct.org): Founded by Isaac Magoon and named for his country of birth, Scotland hosts the annual Scotland Highland Festival, held at the Edward Waldo House each Columbus Day weekend in Walktober. It's also the birthplace of Samuel Huntington and has a museum at his homestead. State lands also offer a variety of hiking opportunities.

Sprague (1861) (ctsprague.org): The Shetucket River meanders through Sprague, creating incredible views, great paddling and fabulous fishing, especially for salmon. The town's efforts to conserve land has resulted in miles of trails in the Sprague Land Preserve. You'll also find Baltic, an entire village listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Sterling (1794) (sterlingct.us): Long vistas offer lovely views along Rt. 14A and from atop scenic Rt. 49. The Quandock and Moosup Rivers provided power to the mills in the early 1800s and an old rail trail connecting to Rhode Island's trail system now offers a nice woodland walk with views of the Moosup. You'll also find one of the largest corn mazes and an iconic farm in town.

Thompson (1785) (thompsonct.org): West Thompson Dam's miles of trails and beautiful lake enhance a robust town-maintained trail system. Visit the Tri-State Marker and the sight of a historic train wreck. Along with its history, agriculture and New England's largest alpaca farm, Thompson has a little bit of something for everyone.



Union (1734) (unionconnecticut.org): Outdoor recreation rules in the least populous town in Connecticut. Nipmuck State Forest, Bigelow Hollow State Park and Yale-Myers Forest comprise 1/3 of the town's forest land (that's 34,000 acres). The town's motto? Smallest town, biggest heart.

Voluntown (1721) (voluntown.gov): An outdoorsperson's playground, Voluntown is more than 70 percent state forestland and the heart of Pachaug State Forest, the largest forest in CT. You can camp, glamp or backpack like a true thru hiker in Voluntown. A farmer's market can fuel your outdoor adventures and a historic CCC camp awaits your discovery.

Windham/Willimantic (1692) (windhamct.com): A true mill town, Windham and its city within, Willimantic, boast incredible Victorian architecture, the famous Frog Bridge, a vibrant downtown food scene and a new outdoor stage. Home to Eastern Connecticut State University, the Air Line Trail makes its way through town and you'll find one of The Last Green Valley Letterbox Trail stops here. The town's Lauter Park also boasts a skate and BMX park designed by skaters for skaters.

Woodstock (1686) (woodstockct.gov): Area-wise, as the second largest town in CT. Woodstock is home to numerous working farms offering fresh food, CSAs and much more. Start your Bull Hill hike on the Woodstock side of this Wyndham Land Trust property, visit the amazing Pink House (aka Roseland Cottage), or stroll through Roseland Park and Palmer Arboretum.

Explore!Scenic Route 169 -A National Scenic Byway

Stretching more than 47 miles from Norwich, CT to Charlton, MA, Route 169 is a drive through history, a slice of life in Southern New England and an opportunity to escape to a quieter, more peaceful place. Just a note, Route 169 is known by many street names as it traverses the National Heritage Corridor.

The information here is listed from south to north along Route 169 and is color-coded by interest:

- **■** History
- Outdoor Activities
- **■** Tastes, Sips, Retail & Entertainment



Start your historic trek at the southern end of Rt. 169 at **Leffingwell House Museum**, 348 Washington St., Norwich, CT, located across the road from the beginning of Rt. 169. Built in 1675, the museum's architecture and history tell the story of the colonies and early America. Learn more on pgs. 54 and 112.

If you enjoy history, there are many **Cemeteries**, some pre-dating the nation, dotting Rt. 169 along its length that are fascinating places to explore.

Norwich's **Mohegan Park** is an oasis in the city featuring swimming, walking trails, disc golf, several playgrounds and the city's famous Rose Garden. See pgs. 47, 86 and 163 for more information.

Ouellet Park is just off Rt. 169 at 20 Old Canterbury Tpke., Norwich. The park gives access to fishing at Taftville Reservoir and has a playscape and playing fields. See pg. 39 for more information.

Lisbon Meadows Park & Trails has parking right on Rt. 169 (just south of the Rt. 138/169 intersection) in Lisbon and features trails, playing fields and open fields for family-fun. Learn more on pgs. 47 and 85.

In Lisbon you will find the **John Bishop House** at 11 Rt. 169, an 11-room Georgian
post-and-beam farmhouse built in 1810. The
John Bishop House is a slice of the agricultural
history of Southern New England. See pg. 112
to learn more.

A small detour on Rt. 138 will bring you to the **Anshei Israel Synagogue**, 142 Newent Rd., Lisbon, which is designated on the National Register of Historic Places. Pg. 112 offers more information.

The Burnham Tavern sits at 223 North Burnham Hwy, Lisbon, and was built in the early 1700s. It became an important stop for colonial troops during the American Revolution. While currently closed for renovations, the property leads to about 1.5 miles of walking trails marked with interpretative signs. For more information, see pg. 112.

State Heroine Prudence Crandall ran a private school for girls in her home at the intersection Rts. 169 and 14 in Canterbury, which is now The Prudence Crandall Museum at 1 South Canterbury Rd., Canterbury. At the behest of Norwich's Sarah and Mary Harris, Crandall began educating young Black women, which led to Crandall being arrested and threats on her life and those of her students. See pg. 114 to learn more.

Paddle the **Quinebaug River National** Recreation Water Trail from the boat launch on Butts Bridge Rd. in Canterbury, less than a half-mile from Rt. 169. See pg. 128 for more information.

The Finnish American Heritage Society, 76 North Canterbury Rd., Canterbury, tells

the story of Finnish American immigration and its role in the region. The Society also offers many programs throughout the year, including the chance to experience Finnish food at its finest. See pg. 109 for more information.

The last weekend of August means The **Brooklyn Fair** with the fairgrounds right on the National Scenic Byway.

The Brooklyn Historical Society sits in the heart of Brooklyn's National Historic District at 25 Canterbury Rd., Brooklyn. The museum shares the exploits of Revolutionary War Gen. Israel Putnam, while the law office is the 19th century office of Putnam's great-grandson Daniel Putnam Tyler and is furnished as it might have been during his career. Learn more on pgs. 48 and 107.

Davis Forest & Disc Golf Course is just a few minutes off Rt. 169 at the end of Salmon Dr. in Brooklyn and features an 18-hole forested disc golf course and walking trails. Learn more on pg. 46.

Lapsley Orchard at 403 Orchard Hill Rd., Pomfret Center, features a classic New England farm stand open mid-July through Dec. 24th. See pgs. 64 and 120 for more information.

Mashamoguet Brook State Park/Wolf Den,

147 Wolf Den Dr. (Rt. 44), just off Rt. 169, is where the outdoors and history meet. Hike a 4.75-mile loop to the Wolf Den, a site on the National Register of Historic Places, Enjoy numerous other outdoor adventures. Find more information on pgs. 30 and 88.

If your travels have you thirsty, Watercure Farm Distillery, 426 Mashamoguet Rd., Pomfret Center, has spirits for you that are distilled right in front of you. See pgs. 66, 137 and 168 for more information.

Bring binoculars when you visit the **Connecticut Audubon Center at Pomfret,**

218 Day St., Pomfret, for spectacular sightings of birds and other wildlife on this beautiful property. Audubon runs programs yearround. Learn more on pgs. 87, 100 and 118.

You won't miss the stunning connecting bridge that takes The Air Line State Park **Trail** over Rt. 169 in Pomfret. The Air Line Trail is a great place to walk, run, bike and more from a parking area off Railroad St. in Pomfret Center. See pgs. 28, 72, 94, 102, 153 and 174, for more about the iconic Air Line Trail.

If trail races in iconic locations interest you, Tackle The Trail supports the QVCC Foundation and is held during Walktober on the Air Line Trail. Learn more on pgs. 57, 75 and 121.

You'll find breakfast, lunch and dinner and live music at the Vanilla Bean Café, 450 Deerfield Rd., Rt. 97, Pomfret, or a sweet treat to keep you fueled for more adventures. Learn more on pgs. 24 and 168.

Surprise your loved one with a bouquet of fresh flowers from Garden Gate Florist at 30 Putnam Rd., Pomfret. Learn more on pgs. 135 and 173.

For a sit-down dining experience consider **Grill 37**, one of TLGV's Tastes of the Valley partners. The restaurant is just off Rt. 169 at 37 Putnam Rd., Pomfret. Visit www.grill37.com to learn more.

Take home a selection of pasture-raised beef and other farm fresh foods from **Pinecroft Farms** at 159 Butts Rd., Woodstock. Learn more on pgs. 65 and 136.

Loos Center for the Arts at Woodstock Free Academy, 150 Rt. 169, Woodstock, will offer you entertainment year-round in their renovated auditorium. You'll find more information on pgs. 23 and 54.

If you're traveling on Labor Day Weekend, soak in the long-running **Woodstock Fair**, hosted by the Woodstock Agricultural Society, at 281 Rt. 169, Woodstock. See pgs. 25, 57 and 122, for more information.

In the mood for wine, cider or beer? Visit **Taylor Brooke Winery and Brewery** just a few minutes off Rt. 169 at 818 Rt. 171, Woodstock. Learn more on pgs. 65, 122, 141, 142 and 168.

Roseland Park is just off Rt. 169 at 205 Roseland Park Rd., Woodstock. It's open yearround and you can stroll, paddle, fish, picnic and more! See pgs. 38, 92, 121, 128 and 178, for more information.

The Inn at Woodstock Hill, 94 Plaine Hill Rd., Woodstock, offers historic luxury for you to spend a night, or a few, during your tour of the National Scenic Byway. See pgs. 19 and 173 for more information.

Woodstock Orchards at 494 Rt. 169, Woodstock, has a farm store featuring a variety of local fruits and vegetables, a bakery and more. The store is open year-round. For more information, see pgs. 66 and 122.

Palmer Arboretum at 523 Rt. 169, Woodstock, offers ample opportunity for both education about local plants and a chance to find moments of serenity. Learn more on pg. 55. A labyrinth awaits visitors to the **First Congregational Church – U.C.C.** at 543 Rt.

Explore! The Washington-Rochambeau **Revolutionary Route**

The Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route is a National Historic Trail with locations from Massachusetts to Virginia. It commemorates the journey American and French forces made to and from the Seige of Yorktown, Virginia in 1781 and 1782. This list of sites includes all those located in The Last Green Valley. It begins on the border with Rhode Island then travels west to Lebanon, CT.

In 1778, the French formally allied with the colonists, but it was not until the summer of 1780 that troops under the command of General Jean Baptiste Donatien de Vimeur, comte de Rochambeau arrived in Newport, RI. General George Washington and General Rochambeau agreed joint military efforts should not begin until spring of 1781 so the French forces wintered in New England.

The first stop on the Trail is two stops in one and actually the last place French troops stayed in Connecticut on their way home after the Revolution. In November 1782, in what was then Voluntown but is now Sterling, French troops camped on Sterling Hill. Known along the trail as French Infantry Campsite 49 (north) in Voluntown it is the 49th campsite of the French forces as they returned from Virginia. The camp was in the fields east of Dorrance Tavern on the north side of Plainfield Pike (Rt. 14A) in Sterling, There is a marker for Camp 49 at 751 Plainfield Pike, Sterling, CT.

Samuel Dorrance Inn/Dorrance Tavern,

748 Plainfield Pike (Rt. 14A), Sterling, CT is where the officers stayed and dined. The officers included the marguis de Chastellux and comte de Rochambeau, Baron Ludwig von Closen, aide-de-camp to General Rochambeau, kept a journal and wrote of their march through Connecticut, "We have, on the whole, been treated wonderfully well wherever the army has marched."

On their way to Yorktown, VA, the French forces made their first stop in Connecticut at French Infantry Campsite 3 (south) in Plainfield where they stayed from June 19-23, 1781. From written accounts, about 30 local families were welcoming, and the locals and troops shared music, dance and food. There are two plagues commemorating the campsite: a bronze plaque erected in 1929 on the east side of Rt. 12 about 0.4 miles north of the First Congregational Church, commemorating the Dorrance Homestead

and the Captain Eleazar Cady House, locations used by French officers; and another plaque on the north-east corner of Gallup St. and Rt. 12 commemorating the site of the Eaton Tayern.

Traveling to the next site in Canterbury, the French Encampment at Westminster is another location where the French stayed after Yorktown. Nov. 7-8, 1782 marked the 48th encampment of the French forces on their way to Boston. There is a marker at Westminster Congregational Church, 395 Westminster Rd. (Rt. 14), Canterbury, CT.

In 1781 the French troops marched from Plainfield to Windham for their next encampment, passing the birthplace of Samuel Huntington, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. See pg. 110 to learn more about the **Huntington Homestead**.

The French stopped in Windham both going to and coming from Virginia in support of the colonists in the Revolution. French Infantry Campsite 4 is the location the troops camped June 20-23, 1781 on their way to Virginia. They camped next to the Shetucket River.

On Nov. 5-7, 1782 at French Infantry

Campsite 47 (north) in Windham, French forces made their second encampment in town on their way back to Providence.

This site is east of the first site. On Rt. 14 next to a stonewall-lined field is a plaque commemorating both encampments. Neither camp was at the exact location, but this is the closest roadside marker.





As the troops left Windham they journeyed to Bolton, just outside the Heritage Corridor. However, another site in The Last Green Valley played a vital role in both the French effort in the Revolution and the colonial planning of the Revolution.

From Windham make your way to the iconic **Lebanon Town Green.** From Nov. 1780 to June 1781, Lebanon provided winter quarters for 220 French cavalry soldiers known as hussars of Lauzun's Legion. Connecticut Governor Jonathan Trumbull also held more than 1,000 meetings in what we now know as the War Office. Those who met at the **War Office** include George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Henry Knox, Marquis de Lafayette, Rochambeau, Marquis de Chastelux, Israel Putnam, Samuel Parsons, Joseph Spencer, Jedediah Huntington and Duc de Lauzun.

You can learn much more about Lebanon's role in the Revolution from the **Lebanon Historical Society,** see pq. 23 for details.

The cove is a significant fish and wildlife habitat area known for sheltering flocks of wintering birds. Bald eagles are a common sight during the winter months. No fee.

Quinebaug River National Water Trail (NRT) – An Overview

Holland, MA to Canterbury, CT thelastgreenvalley.org The Quinebaug River National Recreation Water Trail offers 45 miles of paddling stretching from Holland, MA to Canterbury, CT. Many of the segments provide an opportunity for family-friendly outdoor adventures with a surprisingly remote feel; wildlife is abundant and the only traces of civilization are the remnants of old mills. Before you go, be sure to check the Paddle Guide (thelastgreenvalley.org). There are a few stretches of challenging whitewater that demand serious paddling skills and some sections are not safe for anyone to paddle. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT – Holland Pond to East Brimfield Lake

Pond-Bridge Rd., Holland, MA 01521 thelastgreenvalley.org

A dozen free parking spaces in the unpaved parking lot at the put-in & more in an adjacent lot. This segment is within the East Brimfield Lake Project of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is a designated Watchable Wildlife Area. Paddle downstream 3.9 miles to East Brimfield Lake Boat Ramp with little current, extensive wildlife habitat, 3 picnic landings and no portages. Excellent 3-hour

outing for beginning paddlers and families, though once you enter the open water of East Brimfield Lake, strong winds can be daunting. Paddle conditions are best when flow is more than 50 cubic feet per second (cfs), as measured by the online USGS Streamgage at East Brimfield, Below 20 to 30 cfs, it will be a scratchy and weedy ride. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT -**East Brimfield Lake**

Across from 366-398 Sturbridge Rd. Fiskdale, MA 01581, thelastgreenvalley.org Plenty of parking at East Brimfield Lake Boat Ramp. Because current is not an issue. you can paddle upstream to Holland Pond, downstream, or both, depending on the weather, your time and stamina. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT -**West Dudley to Fabyan**

11-37 West Dudley Road, Dudley, MA 01571 thelastgreenvalley.org Launch for West Dudley Pond is adjacent to the parking area. There is vehicular access and a turn-around to drop off your boat and gear. Launch for the West Dudley to Fabyan segment is downstream of the rail trail bridge, on river right. The impounded river behind West Dudley Hydro Dam (also known as Paper Mill Dam) provides a pleasant stretch of river with current and plenty of water even in dry conditions. Paddle around the pond, or upstream until either current or scratchy rocks convince you to turn back. West Dudley Pond is an ideal place for family outings and novice paddlers. Keep an eye on the wind as the open water is about 0.75 mile long and 400 feet wide. The paddle below the dam to Fabvan includes quickwater, river turns with Class I whitewater, small islands with narrow channels and fallen trees. You should have enough water to paddle with at least 200 cfs at the USGS Streamgage at Westville Dam. Beware of turbulence from water released from the dam to run the powerhouse; it is

automated and unpredictable. It may get

boney in the half-mile Rock Garden sections between Rt. 131 (Old Turnpike Rd.) and

Rt. 197 at the state line. You will float comfortably again once you pass under Rt. 197. Be careful as you approach Fabyan Dam which is unsafe to shoot. Hug the shore on river's left and enter the marked channel for the take-out/portage. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT -**Fabyan to West Thompson Lake**

622 Fabvan-Woodstock Rd. N. Grosvenordale, CT 06255 thelastgreenvallev.org, nae.usace.army.mil/Missions/Recreation/West-Thompson-Lake/

Park in small lots on either side of Fabvan-Woodstock Rd; carry is less than 250 feet. This segment is within the West Thompson Lake project of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is 5.8 miles long with some moving water but no rapids, some flat water, extensive wildlife habitat and no portages. It is an excellent 3 hour outing for paddlers who are comfortable with moving water. Before you go, check the West Thompson Lake dam website for "West Thompson Lake Real Time Water Levels;" if you have at least 225 cfs, you will have a pleasant ride. Below that level, you'll scrape or have to walk. As you leave the shelter of the river and enter West Thompson Lake, wind can be a factor. Hug the left shore for the final mile to the West Thompson Lake Boat Ramp. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT -**West Thompson Lake**

341-365 Reardon Rd.,

N. Grosvenordale, CT 06255 thelastgreenvalley.org, nae.usace.army.mil/Missions/Recreation/ West-Thompson-Lake/ 25-30 free parking spaces at the West Thompson Lake Boat Ramp: you can drive down to the water to unload/load. Paddle around the lake and venture upstream to the north end where the Ouinebaug River enters. Winds are changeable and can make paddling difficult, especially for inexperienced and young paddlers. No fee.



Quinebaug River NRT – Putnam to Pomfret

80-82 Kennedy Drive, Putnam, CT 06260 thelastgreenvalley.org

About 12 parking spaces. The shoreline is a grassy bank with a 1-2 foot drop to the water; this can be tricky, depending on water levels. The trip to Rt. 101 in Pomfret is 5.9 miles with current, some quick-water and flat-water, but no portages. It is an excellent 2 hour outing for paddlers who are comfortable with moving water. This section holds water well and may be navigable when other sections are too low. Beginners will enjoy this stretch with moderate flow of 300 to 600 cfs on the USGS Streamgage at Cargill Falls, Putnam. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT – Riverside Park, Brooklyn

18 Day Street, Brooklyn, CT 06234 thelastgreenvalley.org

River access is at the end of the parking lot on the left. The Town of Brooklyn's Riverside Park Canoe Launch is very user-friendly. Both novice and experienced paddlers can enjoy several hours here. The site is easy to find, has good parking, and can be used almost all year. It is a good place for fishing and a picnic although there are no restroom facilities. Paddlers can travel three to four miles upstream and then return back downstream to the launch site. Caution – do not paddle downstream from the launch. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT – Killingly to Plainfield

43 Wauregan Rd., Killingly, CT 06239 thelastgreenvalley.org

Plenty of parking, even if ball games are in progress. Park and carry your boat down the gravel driveway between the baseball fields to the paved Quinebaug River Trail. Turn left onto the trail and carry about 100 feet more to the kiosk. This is the most challenging segment of water trail on the Quinebaug. You can paddle 5.3 miles to the CT DEEP Fish Hatchery, or continue on to Robert Manship Park in Canterbury for a 10-mile outing. Along the way, you'll encounter lots of quick-water, several Class II rapids, spiky remnants of dams, some flat-water and no portages. It is a challenging outing for experienced paddlers. With moderate flows, this stretch of the river moves swiftly with broad, powerful current. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT – Plainfield to Canterbury

139-159 Trout Hatchery Rd., Plainfield, CT 06374 thelastgreenvalley.org

When the gate is open, you can drive to the launch and drop off or pick up boats, but you are not permitted to park there. There is plenty of parking outside the gate which is several hundred feet from the river. The 4.7 miles of paddling to Robert Manship Park in Canterbury is somewhat less challenging

than the miles above the hatchery, but there are several stretches of white water to paddle carefully. Generally, the river is wide, undeveloped, tree-lined and very beautiful! Watch for the Rt. 14 bridge as you near Robert Manship Park. As you approach the take-out on river right, stay close to the right bank and arrange your group in a line. The broad current can make this a tricky landing. Have the first paddlers ashore catch subsequent boats as they pull in. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT - Robert Manship Park to Butts Bridge, **Canterbury**

39-55 Lovell Lane, Canterbury, CT 06331 thelastgreenvalley.org

At the bottom of the sloping driveway, the launch is straight ahead. Plenty of parking spaces in that corner of the park. Portable restrooms often available. The path to the water is moderately sloped and can be slippery. After Robert Manship Park, the current slows and the river makes five large, meandering turns. The lack of current may make paddling feel sluggish and you may wonder whether the bends will ever end! 5.6 miles to Butts Bridge. No fee.

Quinebaug River NRT – Butts Bridge to Aspinook Pond, Canterbury

67 Butts Bridge Rd., Canterbury, CT 06331 thelastgreenvalley.org

Room for many cars. You can pull up right to the water's edge. The landing is a nearly flat firm surface into the flatwater of Aspinook Pond. Anglers launch power boats here, too, so it can be busy during weekends. No public restrooms. The still water of Aspinook Pond and easy access make this an excellent place for novice paddlers to learn new skills safely. The scenery is less dramatic than upriver, but you may see everything from bald eagles and osprey to wood ducks, Canada geese and mergansers. You can paddle downriver on the pond almost 3 miles to Jewett City. No fee.

At low flows, the first hundred yards can be shallow. The East Brookfield River below Lake Lashaway can be accessed at the end of Connie Mack Dr. In low water, these segments may be best to paddle up from Quaboag Pond. Be prepared for beaver dams, too.

Shetucket River National Recreation Water Trail (NRT) - An Overview

Windham to Norwich, CT thelastgreenvallev.org

The Shetucket River National Recreation Water Trail provides paddlers with 22 miles of paddling enjoyment with four portages. Follow the Shetucket River Water Trail starting at the Lauter Park Launch in Willimantic and ending 22 river miles downstream at Harold T. Brown Memorial Park in Norwich, Before you go, be sure to check the Paddle Guide (thelastgreenvalley.org) for information on each segment. No fee.

Shetucket River NRT -Lauter Park to Plains Road

619 Jackson St., Willimantic, CT 06226 thelastgreenvallev.org

Plenty of parking along road and for several cars near boat launch. Relatively easy put-in but beware of large rock at launch location depending on water levels. Lauter Park is a popular paddling starting point and is actually on the Natchaug River which quickly meets up with the Willimantic, where together they form the Shetucket. Depending on water levels the river moves with some current but is still relatively easy for novice paddlers. The river passes under Rt. 66, makes three sharp turns, then flows under the Rt. 14 Main Street bridge and passes the wastewater treatment facility. 3.2 miles to the Plains Road landing, just under the Plains Road bridge on the western shore (river right.) Be aware of current when approaching the landing. No fee.

Shetucket River NRT – Plains Road to Salt Rock State Park & Campground, Baltic (Sprague)

305-331 Plains Rd., Windham, CT 06226 thelastgreenvallev.org Ample parking at town rec fields for many cars. 50-foot carry to top of riverbank, then 25-foot long steep incline to the water. This 7-mile segment is popular & scenic, passing railroad tracks, Rt. 32, and finally into a more wooded habitat, offering common sightings of eagles, osprey, muskrat, otters & more. A mile from the launch you'll approach an 800-foot island. Paddle to the east side (river left) through the wider channel. Pass under the Rt. 203 bridge (which can be used for an emergency exit only but is not a public landing or launch location) and note that you will also pass the private Windham Fish & Game Club, which is not a public landing either. Five miles from the Plains Road Launch, paddlers must portage the Scotland Dam. DO NOT PADDLE OVER SCOTLAND DAM! The portage is on the western shore (river right), 350 feet long with the first 50 feet up a hill beside dam, then down a sloping path to launch location below the dam. This is a great spot to relax and rest up for the remainder of the paddle to Salt Rock State Park, Drier summer months can make the stretch below the dam very "bony." Salt Rock State Park is approximately 2 miles from the dam on the eastern shore (river left). You can exit the river at Salt Rock by carrying your boat 300 feet from landing, through tunnel under railroad

tracks to parking area. No fee.



Shetucket River NRT – Salt Rock State Park & Campground to Sprague River Park

137 Scotland Rd., Baltic (Sprague), CT 06330 thelastgreenvalley.org

Parking area is 300 feet from river through flat pedestrian tunnel running under railroad tracks. Paddle the 2.1 miles from the campground to the popular small park which attracts fly fishermen and is home to picnic benches, grills and a portable restroom available on site in warmer months. The landing on the east side of river (river left) can be tricky with exposed rocks on both sides of the shore. Depending on water levels, stay middle/right of river approaching landing, then paddle hard left across current to the beach/landing area. No fee.

Shetucket River NRT – Sprague River Park to Occum Dam or Red McKeon Park

24-78 North Main St. (Rt. 97)

Baltic (Sprague), CT 06330, thelastgreenvalley.org
Ample parking in this popular small park.
Launch from park picnic/beach area unless water levels are too low, then launch just under the Rt. 97 bridge instead. Although wide, launching in this area can be a bit bony in low water. Enjoy picturesque coves, inlets and lots of wildlife in the river habitat along this 2.5-mile section on the way to Occum,

where paddlers must portage at the Occum Dam, which has a 14 foot drop. DO NOT PADDLE OVER OCCUM DAM! Approach dam and portage on the eastern side (river left). Carry approximately 150 feet to the launch area below the dam if you'd like to paddle 0.5 miles further south to Red McKeon Park. No fee.

Shetucket River NRT - Occum Dam or Red McKeon Park to Taftville Dam

Occum Dam: 23 Church St. Baltic (Sprague), CT 06330 Red McKeon Park: 30 Taftville-Occum Rd. (Rt. 97). Occum (Norwich), CT 06360 thelastgreenvalley.org Parking at dam is available adjacent to the dam, Mon. - Sat., across from the Versailles United Methodist Church (please do not park here Sundays from 10 am - noon, as it is used for church services.) Launch above the dam to paddle up to Sprague River Park or launch below the dam to paddle down as far as Howard T. Brown Park (7 miles with 2 portages). Parking also at Red McKeon Park, a newer and easier launch just 0.5 further south on Rt. 97 with a 300-foot carry down paved path to launch. Just over 1.5 mile mostly flatwater paddle is easy with just a slight current. Pass houses and woods, travel under Rt. 395 and past a large trash incinerator plant. The views of the Ponemah Mill complex and its beautiful towers is something special. This is a popular stretch for fishing. Paddlers must portage at the Taftville Dam, a large and imposing structure 500 feet across the river and one of the most difficult on the Shetucket. DO NOT PADDLE OVER TAFTVILLE DAM! Take out on eastern shore (river left) above the dam. This landing is closed to vehicle access from Nov. 1 - April 1. No fee.



Shetucket River NRT - Taftville Dam to Greeneville Dam

Riverview Dr./Boat Launch Dr. (off Rt. 169) Lisbon, CT 06351, thelastgreenvalley.org Parking & launch areas are accessed from Riverview Dr. (also the entrance to Wheelabrator Technologies Lisbon), and are closed to vehicles from Nov. 1 - April 1. Put in via several steps with handrails from the top of the dam to the rocky put in location below the dam. It is a long 700+ feet carry from parking, down steps to launch. *This section is not recommended for most paddlers due to rocky & varying conditions, dramatic changes in water levels, plus very bony paddling as you approach downtown Norwich. This 2.4mile section carries you past the Rt. 12 bridge and to the confluence with and the end of the 60-mile long Quinebaug River (river left). Next, you'll enjoy pretty habitat on the eastern shore (river left) and another popular fishing location. Paddlers must portage at the Greeneville Dam on the eastern shore (river left), which can be very muddy! DO NOT PADDLE OVER GREENEVILLE DAM! To exit the river, walk through woods to parking area along the dirt road off Roosevelt Ave., or carry 300 feet to the launch below the dam to continue down to Brown Memorial Park. No fee.

Shetucket River NRT – Greeneville Dam to Howard T. Brown Memorial Park

Parking for a few cars is located off Roosevelt Ave. on a dirt access road adjacent to river by the river information kiosk. Access river through the woods or carry 1,000 feet to the launch area below the dam. This 2-mile section takes you through a popular fishing area and away from Greeneville Dam's fish lift, which allows migratory fish to move upstream from Long Island Sound & the Thames River into the Shetucket. Paddle through the City of Norwich, past the East Main St. Bridge and to Brown Memorial Park where the Yantic & Shetucket Rivers combine to form the Thames River, Take out in Brown Memorial Park. No fee.

The paddle to River Park is 3 miles long and for experienced paddlers. You'll encounter 2 islands on this stretch. Approach the second island slowly. The quickest route is on the left, but it is narrow and can get blocked with trees. The right side can be shallow. Below this island, after a straight-away, beware of a sharp right turn where the current can range from mild to strong, pushing you to river left. This area has strong eddies and a number of bends. The current begins to slow as you pass under Rt. 44 approaching the River Park landing (river

left). No fee.

Plains Rd., Mansfield, CT 06268 thelastgreenvalley.org, willimanticriver.org 10+ spaces and a nicely landscaped circular drive for easy access unloading boats near the launch. River Park in Mansfield is just upstream of the point where the river becomes an impoundment behind Eagleville Dam. Access for car-top carriers is excellent; the concrete ramp is smooth and wide and the gradual slope to the water's edge makes getting in and out of boats easy. This is the best launch site on the river for novice paddlers and those unfamiliar with paddling in current. The spacious and well-groomed launch site, plus the adjacent playing field, makes it an ideal site for outings with kids. Paddling upstream you will encounter some current, but it's worth the extra effort to explore in this direction until the current gets the best of you. Since the river becomes an impoundment downstream of the launch, this is a good place for a loop trip with no worries about current; just be aware of wind on the lake. 1.4 miles one way to Eagleville Lake. To portage Eagleville Dam, take out on river left. Parking and a takeout also available river right. No fee.

Willimantic River NRT -**Eagleville Lake to Willimantic**

Rt. 275, Mansfield, CT 06268 thelastgreenvalley.org, willimanticriver.org Parking for a few cars on river right (Coventry) or parking for 20 cars river left (Mansfield). Use Mansfield lot for put-in below dam; carry across Rt. 275 to launch along Eagleville Preserve Trail. The river in this segment is narrow, wooded, and flows along railroad tracks and farms. Watch for low branches, downed trees and sand bars, and in high flows, partially submerged farm fences. There are 6 bridges on this section of river; take out river left just after the 6th bridge (Air Line Trail foot bridge). You must exit the river here to avoid dangerous dams in downtown Willimantic, Consult the Paddle Guide for more information prior to launching. No fee.

Willimantic River NRT -Air Line Trail Landing & Launch

42 Wilson St. (Rt. 66 to Bridge St., immediate right into lot at sign for CT Eastern Railroad Museum), Willimantic, CT 06226 thelastgreenvalley.org, willimanticriver.org Parking for a few cars in small area on left side of road approximately 0.5 miles down dirt road. Caution: It is not safe to paddle downstream (to the left facing the river at the launch site), as there is no public landing downstream. Constructed and dedicated in 2016, this launch generally offers an easy upstream (to the right facing the river) paddle except in high waters or after rain. Paddle up 1 mile to the Columbia Rt. 66 bridge, and if conditions allow, continue 6 miles further upstream to Eagleville. Take inside curves for smoother water. With limited development along this stretch, wildlife viewing opportunities exist, such as spotting flying eagles & swimming otters. Paddle as far as the current or your timetable allows, then turn around and return to the Air Line Trail Landing. No fee.
