The Lost Bay Portage area has many birds for viewing – usually in June. The species listed in this brochure have been heard or spotted since 2001.

When hiking this off-trail area visitors should remember the area is covered in vegetation and be prepared for ticks, mosquitoes, and to step in wet areas.

To get to the Lost Bay Portage area, visitors will need to travel by boat from the Rainy Lake boat launch 10.5 miles to the trailhead. **Navigational maps are highly recommended.**

The Lost Bay Portage area covers 0.7 miles from east Lost Bay to north Saginaw Bay on Rainy Lake.

The habitat is a black spruce, leather-leaf, semi-treed bog that phases into a fairly dense black spruce treed bog. Scattered throughout the bog is a series of isolated rock outcrops that support upland forest communities. The bog floor is a continuous mat of sphagnum moss interspersed with short leather-leaf, bog laurel, bog rosemary, labrador tea, and bog birch shrubs. Below the shrubs, pitcher plants, sundews, cranberries, cotton grass, lichens, and many sedge species are dispersed on the peaty organic soil.

The Lost Bay Portage area is a breeding grounds for boreal chickadees, lincoln sparrows, alder fly catchers, western palm warblers, Connecticut warblers, Cape May warblers, Blackburnian warblers, purple finches, ruby crowned and golden crowned kinglets, red crossbills, gray jays, blue jays, sedge wrens, hermit thrushes, cedar waxwings, and olive-sided and yellow-bellied flycatchers.



Bird rank indicates their abundance during all years of monitoring on this scale:

- A = abundant to most abundant
- C = common
- U = uncommon
- R = rare to least abundant
