Where can I see rock art?

Petroglyphs (rock carvings) and pictographs (rock paintings) are found throughout the Southwest. The sites listed below are open to the public. In order to preserve these and other sites, DO NOT touch, vandalize, add

anything to, or make rubbings or tracings of these images. Help protect these fragile resources. If you see someone defacing rock art or other cultural resources, report the incident to a ranger or call the Archeological Resources Protection Act Task Force at 1-800-2-ARPA-86. Please, take only pictures and memories. Leave only footprints. Please note that the times listed vary by season.

Arizona

Deer Valley Rock Art Center

A 1/4 mile trail takes you past a bouldercovered hillside with more than 1500 petroglyphs created over a span of 5000 years.

South Mountain Park

Petroglyphs are scattered throughout the park. Because of vandalism, location information is given out by a ranger when you arrive at the park.

In Phoenix, take I-17 to I-10 east, exit at Baseline Road west to Central Ave. south to park entrance.

The 1/2 mile Black Rock Loop Trail has some petroglyphs. The 2 mile round-trip Waterfall Trail leads to the Petroglyph Plaza.



Black Rock Loop Trail and the first 1/2 mile of the Waterfall Trail are accessible \$5/private car



Ranger station and park open 6am-8pm. Waterfall Trail closes at 5:30pm. In Phoenix, take I-17 to Dunlap Ave. west. Follow Dunlap, which becomes Olive St., to park entrance.

Saguaro National Park

(520)733-5153 Saguaro West A 1/4 mile trail at the Signal Hill Picnic Area leads you up a small hill to petroglyph-covered boulders.

In Tucson, take I-10 to the Speedway Rd. west exit. Speedway Rd. turns into Gates Pass Rd. Turn right on Kinney to park entrance. Motorhomes and vehicles pulling trailers not recommended; call for directions. Once in the park, the Signal Hill Picnic Area is located along Bajada Loop Drive.





Petroglyph National Monument


More than 17,000 prehistoric and historic American Indian and Hispanic petroglyphs have been recorded in the monument. Rinconada and Boca Negra canyons have trails leading to many petroglyph sites.

Bandelier National Monument

The I mile round-trip Ruins Trail starts at the monument visitor center and takes you past Long House, along the face of a petroglyph and pictograph-covered cliff wall.

Three Rivers Petroglyph National Recreation Site

Two short trails lead to some of the 22,000 examples of rock art found at this site. The I/2 mile Petroglyph Trail starts at the visitor shelter and leads to a hillside petroglyph site. The trail is unpaved and somewhat steep in places.



A trail leading to the picnic area is partially accessible. A spotting scope is provided, with which you can see a few petroglyphs.

Open 24 hours with an on-site host From Albuquerque, take I-25 south to US 380 east to US 54 south. Park entrance is located off US 54.

Texas

Hueco Tanks State Historical Park

Look for petroglyphs scattered on boulders along the many short trails.

Utah

Sand Island Recreation Area

An unpaved road overlooking the San Juan River takes you past petroglyph-covered cliff walls. A fence separates viewers from the rock art.



Some petroglyphs may be visible with binoculars from your vehicle.

Capitol Reef National Park

A 1/8 mile trail starts at a pullout on Highway 24 and leads you to a large panel with petroglyphs created by the Fremont culture, AD 700-1300.


