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## Educational Opportunities at Andersonville



A visit to Andersonville National Historic Site provides a unique opportunity to study the prisoner of war experience from the American Revolution to modern day.

The National Park Service has developed a series of lesson plans and on-site programs designed to help elementary to college-age students understand how the prison at Andersonville fits into the broader Civil War context, and the larger prisoner of war story.
