



# **Discover Capitol Reef**



Located in south-central Utah in the heart of red rock country, Capitol Reef National Park is a hidden treasure filled with cliffs, canyons, domes and bridges in the Waterpocket Fold, a geologic monocline (a wrinkle on the earth) extending almost 100 miles.

The park preserves natural and cultural resources including desert habitat and remnants of Fremont Culture and Mormon Pioneer History.





## Hiking

The park is a hiker's paradise. A must see is the moderate 2 mile (3.2 km) round-trip hike to Hickman Bridge.

#### Scenic Drive

Enjoy stunning scenery on the 20 mile (32 km) round-trip drive suitable for passenger vehicles. Entrance fee required.

## Visitor Center & Bookstore

Open year-round from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm with extended summer hours. Exhibits, information and a park movie.

# Fruita Campground

The developed campground, located near historic fruit orchards, is open year-round. Nightly fee required.

## Gifford House

Historic Gifford House is open spring to fall from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm. Exhibits on pioneer history, gift shop and daily fresh baked pies.

### Directions

Capitol Reef is a remote national park located in south-central Utah and is accessed from Utah State Highway 24. If traveling southbound or northbound from I-15, several travel choices are possible. Use a map to plan your best route.

Traveling westbound from Interstate 70: Take Utah State Highway 24 (exit 149) southwest towards Hanksville. The visitor center is 95 miles (150 km) from Interstate 70.
