

Reservations

Reservations are required and may be made at the Carlsbad Cavern visitor center or by calling 505/785-2232 anytime between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. MST. IF YOU ARE UNABLE TO KEEP YOUR RESERVATION, PLEASE NOTIFY THE PARK AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. Tours are limited to 25 people. NO exceptions! The National Park Service reserves the right to cancel or alter tours as necessary.

Tour Schedule

Equipment

Ranger guided flashlight tours are offered daily during the summer months and weekends only from September through May.

Bring a strong flashlight for each person and carry drinking water. Wear hiking boots or good walking shoes for the steep, rocky trail from the parking lot and for the steep, slippery trail in the cave. Photography is permitted; however, tripods are not. Tours last approximately two hours and require about 1¹/₄ miles of walking in the cave.

Video cameras are not recommended. Low light levels make photography very difficult. Baby carriers, infant backpacks and strollers are not permitted. Lock valuables in your car trunk.



Parts of the New Cave tour may be considered physically strenuous. Conditions of the trail vary seasonally from wet to dry. At times the tour may include walking steep slippery slopes and using a rope as a handline to climb a slope. Light is provided exclusively by handheld flashlights and lanterns. Although lighting is adequate, persons who experience difficulty with low levels of light will find the tour difficult. A portion of the tour includes sitting in total darkness.
