Underground Railroad

In the early 1700s, some Virginia slaves fled to King Opessa's Town in Western Maryland where the Shawnee tribe harbored the runaways. Colonial governors negotiated for the return of the slaves, but the Shawnee resisted. The coming together of these two cultures signaled the early stages of the Underground Railroad.
