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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a plain two-story brick house in the late Federal vernacular style. At each end of the house there is a stepped gable parapet with two chimneys. The chimney tops are corbeled in a vernacular form which can be traced back to Elizabethan practice. The facade has the typical five-bay division of the period, with a center entrance. The treatment of the door and window heads consists of vertical jointed bricks, instead of stone lintels or keystones. Otherwise the door and windows have no stylistic treatment. The sills are of sandstone. The double-hung sash have nine panes over six. There are two windows in the south end of the building, and one opening on the north end which has been bricked in.

At the south end there is a small one-story ell-shaped wing to the east. There is not general agreement as to whether it is older or younger than the main block. It has a door and two windows on the east side. There are two small square windows in the half-story gable of the east end. On the north side of the ell there is a wooden frame lean-to, with a modern brick chimney.

The house faces Canal Road, which runs parallel to the Ohio-Erie Canal, a portion of which is a National Historic Landmark at this point. The land is in an area which is marginal to the proposed boundaries of the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area and is being studied for possible acquisition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is one of the two earliest brick houses in the lower Cuyahoga Valley, built the same year as the construction of the Akron-Cleveland section of the Ohio-Erie Canal. It is a rare example of late Federal vernacular brick construction in its location.

Stephen Frazee settled on the land where the present house stands in 1812, and according to a county history was for many years "among the prominent pioneers." The tax records indicate that the house was built in 1826. That was the summer that construction work was actively in progress on the canal, which runs practically at the doorstep of the house, prior to its opening July 4, 1827. At the time of the next census (1830), Frazee was fifty years old, and he and his wife had seven children. He is also included in a list of Independence Township residents on the east side of the river in 1843. In 1850 he was living in the house with a son-in-law. The house was acquired by John Hynton, the name by which it is locally known, in 1861. Frazee died in 1868.

A lengthy conjectural interpretation (1961) has tried to link the builder of the first Western Reserve College building in Hudson with this house and the Hale House of the same date, ten miles south on the west side of the river. This is based solely on the fact that they are all brick Federal vernacular buildings, but is completely undocumented.
