TRAVELING TRUNKS PROGRAM

Fort Larned National Historic Site sponsors a Traveling Trunks Program conducted by Park Volunteer David Clapsaddle, Ph.D. The program has reached schools in five states and continues to perpetuate the legacy of the Santa Fe Trail by engaging students with trail adventures and fun.

Dr. Clapsaddle has created seven separate programs, each with a trunk of 19th century vintage accompanied by a story related to the artifacts contained in the trunk. Each story relates to the Santa Fe Trail. Dr. Clapsaddle's presentation includes a reading of the story, a display of the artifacts – many are passed around, and a question/answer period. The program is available at NO COST to elementary schools, public and private.







