175th Anniversary of the Fort's Founding

"At sunrise mustered all the people to hoist the Flag Staff of the new Establishment and in presence of the Gentlemen, Servants, Chiefs and Indians Baptised it by breaking a Bottle of Rum on the Flag Staff and repeating the following words in a loud voice, 'In behalf of the Ho'noble Hudsons Bay Co'y I hereby name this establishment Fort Vancouver God Save King George the 4th ' with three cheers."

Welcome to the Celebration of the 175th Anniversary of Fort Vancouver's founding. As we revisit the moment of the Fort's dedication, we look back at a crucial turning point in American history. Here would be the new Headquarters for the Hudson's Bay Company and the new center for Northwest commerce, industry, and agriculture. Here would be the beginnings of the timber industry and the skilled trades such as carpentry, blacksmithing, and ship-building.

Working under a British flag, the Fort's diverse workforce included French Canadians, Native Americans, Hawaiians, and Britishers. They labored to create a fur trading post which would forever change the land and its people.
