Cow and Calf

Manatees inhabit coastal, estuarine and riverine waters of the tropical and subtropical Atlantic region. *Trichechus senegalensis* of the west African coast, *T. inunguis* of the Amazon River basin, and *T. manatus* of the Caribbean area comprise the three species of this genus. The strictly aquatic manatee is also strictly herbivorous, feeding on green, aquatic higher-plant species, which restricts their distribution to relatively shallow waters. Man is virtually the only predator that manatees need fear, and this is worsened by human exploitation and manipulation of their environment. The West Indian Manatee is listed as an endangered species in the United States. A close relative of the manatee is the dugong (*Dugong dugon*), which inhabits the warm coastal waters of the Indo-Pacific region.

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
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
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
