

Summer Teacher Institutes: Learning is Fun!

This summer teachers can register for two Educational Institutes at the park -- John Brown: the Road to Harpers Ferry will be June 23-27 and Bridging the Watershed runs from July 7-11.

John Brown: the Road to Harpers Ferry - This one-week workshop, June 23 - 27, 2008, guides 4th -12th grade teachers through John Brown's Raid. Who was involved and what really happened? This institute will prepare teachers to use historic documents, images, and new technologies to enhance their teaching and to inspire students with the stories that make history come alive in the classroom and beyond.

This summer institute is limited to twenty-five participants and includes: -books and other teaching resource materials

-field trips to sites in Harpers Ferry NHP and the surrounding area -an opportunity for three hours of graduate credit from Shepherd University at a cost of \$105.

There is no charge for the institute however, teachers are responsible for their own lodging, meals, and travel. Information about local lodging is available.

Teachers will be notified of their acceptance prior to the workshop. Teachers of grades 4-12 and from all disciplines are welcome to attend.

Bridging the Watershed offers a 2008 summer institute at Harpers Ferry National Historical Park and Monocacy National Battlefield Park on July 7 – 11, 2008 for high school environmental science, Earth science, chemistry, biology, integrated physics teachers, National Park Service rangers and volunteers in parks.

Bridging the Watershed (BTW) is an outreach program of the Alice Ferguson Foundation, in partnership with the National Park Service and area schools, whose purpose is to provide personally meaningful, educational experiences that connect students to their place in the natural and cultural world.

During this five-day institute, participants will learn BTW curricula and strategies to implement hands-on activities in the classroom, engage in field studies in national parks, keep a field journaling notebook, and complete a project due at the end of the institute.

Teachers receive a stipend for full participation in the five-day institute plus a follow-up field study with high school students in a national park during September, October, or November 2008. Stipends will be issued in December 2008. This training also qualifies teachers for three graduate credits available from West Virginia University at a cost of \$130. Credit will be issued at end of Fall 2008 semester.
