

Under Fire: The Battle of Harpers Ferry

"We are surrounded by enemy batteries", wrote a Union officer garrisoned at Harpers Ferry on September 15, 1862. On that day, the 12,500-man Union garrison surrendered to Confederate General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson. This military action at Harpers Ferry was the largest surrender of Union troops during the American Civil War. Following the surrender of federal troops, Stonewall marched his army to join General Robert E. Lee at Sharpsburg, Maryland, leaving General A.P. Hill at Harpers Ferry to parole the surrendered troops.

On November 3-4, 2007, Harpers Ferry National Historical Park will present an artillery demonstration and program on General Stonewall Jackson's capture of the 12,500-man Union garrison. Visitors are invited to witness the power of the Confederate artillery that sealed the fate of the federal soldiers. Members of the living history groups Baltimore Light Artillery, Fredericksburg Light Artillery and the Liberty Rifle will portray Confederate artillery soldiers and conduct the demonstrations. A military camp will be open for visitation on the Bolivar Heights

Battlefield.

The Saturday schedule includes artillery firing at II a.m., I p.m. and 3 p.m. Sunday's schedule includes artillery firing at I2 noon, and 2 p.m. Visitors will be shuttled from the Visitor Center at Cavalier Heights to the Bolivar Heights Battlefield from IO:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Saturday and from II a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Sunday.
