Animals at Hubbell Trading Post



John Lorenzo Hubbell moved to the Ganado, Arizona in the 1870's. Here, he started his famous Hubbell Trading Post.

Mr. Hubbell was a wellknown man. He brought all kinds of people closer together. Many people liked Mr. Hubbell because he respected them.

Indians like the Navajo, Hopi, and Zuni came from all over to trade with Mr. Hubbell. They traded items like rugs, baskets, jewelry, and animal skins. Mr. Hubbell would supply the Indians with food, wool, dyes, and things to repair saddles and wagons.



Mr. Hubbell raised many kinds of animals at his trading post. Sheep were very important here. They provided Mr. Hubbell with wool to sell to Navajo weavers. People in other states bought wool for blankets and clothes, too.

Mr. Hubbell had lots of animals to help him move goods across the country. Horses and mules were strong. They carried heavy wagon loads for long distances. People also rode the horses. It was the only way to get from town to town (unless you walked).




