Answer all the questions marked with a cannon.



The questions can be answered in any order. Use the map below to guide you on the adventure. Please note the map is not to scale.



Visitor Center/Museum

 Fort Laramie is part of the National _____

Service. The job of park rangers is to preserve (*save it as it is*) Fort Laramie for the future. Hopefully by the end of your adventure you will understand why this is so important.



 Find the picture of the first fort built on this site. It was called Fort _____. It was built here in _____.

 Give one reason why people left their homes to settle in the West.

 Use the space below to draw a picture of the fort.

 Fort Laramie started as a trading post. Trappers and Indians both used the fort as a place to get supplies and to trade. Find the name of the second fort built here in 1841. It was made of adobe (*mud bricks*) and called Fort _____.

 Wagon trains came to this fort as they traveled on three trails heading west. They were named the 1. _____, 2. _____ and 3. _____ trails. They came here to get food, supplies and to do repairs on their wagons.



 What year did the Army come here? 18____. They came to guard the trails and make sure supplies could get to the wagon trains. The Army gave this place the official name Fort Laramie, from the name of the nearby river. (*Now it's time to go outside! Don't forget your park map.*)

Old Bakery

 Find the Old Bakery (Number 2 on the park map). Soldiers had many jobs here at the fort. One of the jobs was baking bread. Every day as many as 700 loaves a day were baked in the post bakery. How much did one loaf of bread weigh? _____



Parade Ground

 Find the Parade Ground (look for the flagpole). “Dress parade” (*soldiers dressed in their finest uniforms*) was held here once a week on what day? _____ The soldiers also practiced marching and other soldier’s skills here. This was called drill. Here on the parade ground, the flag was raised and lowered every day.



Old Guardhouse

 Find the Old Guardhouse (Number 7 on the park map). This small building was one of the most important at the fort. Here soldiers took turns on “guard duty” (*like being a police officer*). The rooms upstairs were used as a place for guards to live while on duty. Who lived downstairs? _____ Go to the cells around the back. Most of the soldiers who were in here did not follow the rules of Army life.

Captain's Quarters



Find the Captain's Quarters (Number 9 on the park map).

Sometimes families of officers lived at Fort Laramie. Upstairs you will see a child's room. How is it different from your room at home? _____

List two things in this room that you might find in your bedroom.

Old Bedlam



Find Old Bedlam (Number 12 on the park map). This is the oldest standing building at Fort Laramie and in the state of Wyoming! It was built in 18 _____. This was also the same year that the Army arrived here. This building was used for many different purposes.

It was the fort's headquarters (*like the principal's office at school*) and bachelor (*men who are unmarried*) officer's quarters. Go inside. How many stoves and fireplaces are there in this



building? _____ Why do you think every room has a fireplace and stove? _____

Lieutenant Colonel's Quarters

 Find the Lt. Colonel's Quarters or "Burt House" (Number 16 on the park map). This is one of the newest buildings at the fort. An officer named Andrew Burt lived here in the 1880s. He commanded soldiers of the 7th Infantry. His son, named Reynolds, lived here as a boy. In Reynolds' room, there is a toy fort. What is the name on the fort? _____

Bats

 Do you know that bats live here at the fort? Do you see any bats today? _____ This house has many bats in the summer. They live in the attic and sleep during the day. Bats are nocturnal (*active at night*). How might they be helpful to us at the fort? Hint: Think about what they eat. _____



Post Trader's Store

 Find the Post Trader's Store (Number 17 on the park map). This store had things to sell to soldiers, emigrants, civilians and Indians who came to trade. Look inside. What do you think a soldier might want to buy? _____ An emigrant? _____ An officer's wife? _____






Post Office

 Find the Post Office. Fort Laramie had the first post office in Wyoming! Just think how happy you would be to get a letter from home! The Pony Express passed through the fort. Find the monument outside. The Pony Express ran from 18 _____ to 18 _____. The Pony Express lasted a short time before being replaced by the telegraph.

Cavalry Barracks

 Find the Cavalry Barracks (Number 19 on the park map). This is where many soldiers lived. Downstairs is a room with large tables, called the mess room (*like your school lunchroom*). The food the soldiers ate was very simple. Circle the items that you think they might have eaten.



Go upstairs. Count the number of beds that you find. _____ This is the number of soldiers in Company K, 2nd Cavalry that lived here in 1876.

Bonus Question




