




The Hidatsa decorated their clothing and other items with porcupine ______ and trade ______.





Knife River Flint


Knife River Flint is a special stone used to make sharp tools. Hidatsa craftsmen hit large cobbles with hammer stones to make smaller pieces. They shaped these pieces into arrowheads, knife blades, and scrapers.




