## Explore the Prehistoric Past ...

The fossilized bones, shells, leaves, wood, teeth, tracks, nuts, and seeds of the John Day Fossil Beds provide a fascinating glimpse into the Age of Mammals – specifically, the time between the extinction of the dinosaurs and the beginning of the Ice Age.

The monument is comprised of three widely separated units situated in Eastern Oregon: the Sheep Rock Unit, Painted Hills Unit, and Clarno Unit. Open during daylight hours, each unit offers picnic areas, restrooms, information and exhibits, hiking trails, and beautiful scenery.

The Thomas Condon Paleontology Center features a research center, visitor center, and a world-class fossil museum. The James Cant Ranch house features a museum on the cultural history of the area. Both museums are located within the Sheep Rock Unit of the monument. Museum hours vary from season to season, so please call ahead. Entrance into the monument is free.

The Sheep Rock Unit is located at the intersection of US Route 26 and State Route 19, six miles west of Dayville, OR. The Painted Hills Unit is located off US Route 26, nine miles west of Mitchell, OR. The Clarno Unit is located 18 miles west of Fossil, OR, along State Route 218.
