Become a Jr. Ranger

Traveling with children? Encourage them to become a Jr. Ranger. The new Jr. Ranger program will be unveiled in late fall of 2009. This is a great chance for children to learn about Joshua Tree with age appropriate activities. Ask at the visitor center or an entrance station for these FREE booklets. Complete them and return them to any visitor center, entrance station or ranger-led program and receive a Jr. Ranger badge. Volunteer and Be Involved: Make a Difference
