The very valuable Twentynine Palms Ongis, containing 57.559 agree, was acquired by denation on August 16, 1950. This acquisition solved the difficult problem of Hadquarters Site and also provided the Service with a unique geological feature and nature area. Locally, the area is very important historically.

A decision was issued, in connection with the Devor exchange, whereby 1985.60 cores of Southern Pacific land will be acquired by the Service. To date, a copy of the deed has not been received.

On Soptember 25, 1930, the President of the United States approved Public Law 837, 81st Congress revising and reducing the size of the minument from 838,760 acres to 558,548.76 acres. This ended, temperarily at least, the minument intensive efforts to get the entire minument opened to prospecting.

#### SEE VE

To date, travel for the year shows a 575 increase ever the corresponding period of 1950.

Visitor days use shows a 46% increase over the corresponding period of 1950. The establishment of developed compared undoubtedly council most of the increase.

April, 1951 is the only month which showed a decrease and this was because of widespread information that the wildflower display was poor.

### Public Relations

The Superintendent gave a two-night program for the purpose of acquainting the local businessmen with the monument to enable them to better 'sell' the area to the visitor. The future development plans were of great interest to the businessment. The program was under the sponsorship of the Twentynine Palms Sotary Club. About 180 persons were present each night. The Satary Club has requested that this be a yearly event.

Our public relations have improved as a result of new directional signs, the development of compgrounds, ciling of a number of miles of reads, installation of viewfinders at Salton View, and for various other reason reasons.

# ATTATION

All wildlife are in a very satisfactory condition. The bighorn sheep are seen much more frequently than at any time in the history of the momment.

# New Development

Four impressive entyence pylons were constructed at the main entyences.

Twentyfour road dips and protestive dykes were constructed to protect the roads during periods of flash floods.

Sixteen from and sheet iron toilets were constructed and placed in the comparounds.

Thirty-eight concrete comptables and twentyfour fireplaces were constructed and placed in the six newly developed compground areas.

Our water exploration operations proved fruitless. Both wells stopped in solid granite and no water was encountered.

The construction of the low decorative and protective wall around the newly acquired Twentynine Palms Casis is nearing completion. The ciled footpaths, the new parking area, and the temporary interpretive station should be completed in July, 1951.

## Vondalism

Everything connected with the use of this area is on the increase but we believe that vendalism leads the list.

A concrete vault was demolished and the mechanical traffic counter was taken, 50-gallon garbage cans were taken from the comperounds, many signs were shot at and frequently hit, and a 16 foot Jesims-tree with a 9" trunk was felled by severing the trunk with, according to the number of cartridge boxes, about 550 shots.

Two men were arrested and sentenced to pay \$100 each for the digging up of Joshua-trees for transplanting.

Since this area has no clerical staff, one of our two rangers must do only elerical work which leaves one ranger to devote only 40 hours per week to patrol 670 square miles. During the fire season, the two fire control sides rander excellent protective assistance.
