DARK SKY FESTIVAL 2016 AUGUST 12-14

National Parks are becoming islands of natural darkness. As we become more urbanized, our light is spreading further and further, preventing people from seeing stars clearly in many parts of the world. National Parks are some of the few places you can actually see the milky way!

Lassen Volcanic National Park (LVNP) has provided Astronomy programs since the early '80s. In 2011, LVNP imagined a new way to celebrate how wonderful the dark skies actually are: the Dark Sky Festival. This year will mark its fifth installment. In its inaugural year, Dark Sky had three telescopes, five volunteers, and one main program to accommodate around 800 people. Last year, Dark Sky had over 25 telescopes, 50 volunteers, 45 separate programs, and about 4,200 visitors. This is a testament to the popularity of the program. The interest in astronomy is exploding in popularity in all National Parks!

Dark Sky focuses on two main things: scientific pursuits at LVNP relating to searching for life in the solar system and raising awareness of and celebrating a natural dark sky that is almost free from light pollution. Dark Sky also highlights the special relationship Lassen has with NASA and their research into extremophiles, microbes, and hydrothermals. NASA has been studying these microbes to give us an idea of what to look for when searching for life in other areas of our solar system.

Over the years, there have been many special guest speakers at Dark Sky including NASA scientists, university professors, and world-renowned astronomy photographers. This year, we're excited to highlight our guest speaker Bonnie Meinke from the James Webb Space Telescope team. The James Webb Space Telescope is scheduled for launch in October 2018. According to Bonnie, this tennis-court-sized space telescope will be observing the most distant objects in the universe including the first stars and the formation of first galaxies.

Dark Sky will also be highlighting the Perseid Meteor Shower, and views of Saturn, Mars and the moon and its craters. REI will be providing free paddle board & kayaking at night at Butte Lake, allowing visitors a unique experience to paddle under the stars!

To join the Dark Sky event, visit the park after dark on August 12 -14. The night viewing telescopes will be available at the Khom Yah-mah-nee Visitor Center, Bumpass Hell parking area, and the Manzanita Lake campground area. Daytime activities include solar scope viewing, Art & Science Faire at the Loomis Plaza, and various talks throughout the park.



Construction is underway at the Volcano Adventure Camp!

The Volcano Adventure Camp (VAC), located at Crags Campground near Manzanita Lake, is beginning to take shape. The VAC finished project will consist of ten tent cabins housing 80 bunk cots, two picnic pavilions, two fire pits, a shower facility, bear proof lockers, and bear proof trash and recycle bins. The entire facility will be laid with a trail network that will provide universal access from one end of the camp to the other.

Last fall, the National Park Service (NPS) began the ground work by laying the water and sewer lines throughout the project and building the foundation for the shower facility. This summer, construction of the trail network has begun.

The trail work completed so far has been done in part thanks to volunteers from the California Conservation Corps and Boy Scout Troop 604 out of Vermont. Thanks for the helping hands!

NPS has completed the foundation work for the ten tents. Don Ajamian Construction expects to start work on the tent platforms next week with lumber donated by Sierra Pacific Foundation. Once the platforms are completed, the tent frames will be constructed and finished with

The construction on the two picnic pavilions is scheduled to begin July 11 with the concrete foundations. Footings for the pavilion foundations have recently been completed compliments of NPS and volunteers. Accompanying the pavilion work will be the placement of the shower facility. NPS will make the connections for the water to the shower facility to complete that part of the project.

"It's very exciting to see it starting to come together," says Executive Director Jennifer Finnegan. "The park, the Foundation, and the volunteers all seem to be focused on completing the project by August. I think we're all excited to see it populated with kids!"

As for the detail work at the VAC, most of the equipment has been received or ordered including picnic tables, bunk cots, bear-proof lockers, and trash bins. Donor panels and area signage have been designed and are in fabrication. The VAC is ontrack for its ribbon cutting ceremony on August 6!

Reach The Peak Official Trail Dedication – Join us for an official dedication of the newly rehabilitated Lassen Peak Trail on July 30 at 10 a.m., including cake, refreshments, a hike to the summit and a ranger talk on the summit.

Volcano Adventure Camp Ribbon Cutting – Commemorate the official opening of Lassen Volcanic's new youth group campground, Volcano Adventure Camp on August 6 at 10 a.m. with tours, prominent speakers and an unforgettable ribbon cutting.

Day in the Park Festival – Opening of Volcano Adventure Camp coincides with this centennial event on Aug. 6 at the Khom Yah-mah-nee Visitor Center. Activities include displays, presentations by cooperative associations and a barbecue.

Naturalization Ceremony – What better location to spend one's first day as a U.S. citizen than at Lassen Volcanic National Park? One hundred new citizens will state their oath of allegiance and be naturalized at the Manzanita Lake Amphitheater on Aug. 9.

LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK'S CENTENNIAL YEAR 2016

Both Lassen Volcanic National Park and the National Park Service turn 100 in 2016. Throughout the year, Lassen invites visitors to **Find Your Park** through special park and community events:



LASSEN EDUCATION SPECIALIST STEVE ZACHARY RETIRES

Lassen Volcanic National Park's first education specialist retired after 27 years of service this past December. Steve Zachary partnered with teachers throughout northern California to transform Lassen Volcanic into an outdoor classroom. Under his leadership, Lassen's education

program yielded some of the best and most innovative programming in the National Park Service.

Steve came to Lassen with a wealth of teaching experience. He inspired students in environmental studies at University of California, Santa Cruz and San Francisco State University and captivated minds in the Department of Natural Resources at Mendocino College. Later, he served as a guest lecturer for the California State University, Chico teaching program and introduced children to outdoor education through special after school programs.

In nearly three decades of service, Steve developed an expansive education program spanning numerous subjects and program

types. He introduced high school juniors and seniors to National Park Service careers through the summer residential Interpretive Intern program. This competitive program is open to students from six neighboring high schools. Steve immersed students in winter ecology through a Ranger-led Winter Ecology Snowshoe program. Today, the program serves more than 1,000 students from five counties in grades three to six.

Steve's accomplishments also include the development of the Lassen Summer Youth Camping program, which introduces diverse, at-risk, and underserved youth to camping in the park. For the past 21 years, grants provided through the Lassen Park Foundation have supported

camping trips for nearly 500 campers annually.


The unique place-based Astrobiology Intern Program is another component of Steve's legacy. In partnership with Red Bluff High School and NASA Ames Research Center, the program provides hands-on field and lab experiences for college bound high school students and is linked to their chemistry and biology curriculum. Students conduct field research in the park with NASA scientists providing valuable information in support of the Mission to Mars program.

Steve is also appreciated for being one of Lassen's most knowledgeable and passionate rangers. His love and enthusiasm for the park was contagious. Before each workday, he would wander along many miles of park

trails or explore the lesser known backcountry. He studied the park's geology, history, flora, and fauna and willingly shared his knowledge with staff and visitors alike. Lassen already feels his absence, yet each day we are grateful for the legacy he built and the foundation which we will proudly build upon in the park's second century.
