Fort Clatsop NATIONAL MEMORIAL




The Lewis and Clark Expedition spent the winter of 1805-06 at Fort Clatsop after they completed their trail-blazing journey from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean. The fort, named for the local Clatsop Indian tribe, would be their home for 3 months while they prepared for their return trip back to St. Louis the following spring. Nestled in a lush, forested setting, they hunted elk and deer for food, made buckskin clothes, traded with the Indians and prepared final maps and journals of their westward trip.

TODAY the story of the Lewis and Clark Expedition is told through exhibits, brochures, books and audiovisual programs at the Park Visitor Center. A nearby fort replica of Fort Clatsop helps visitors visualize the explorers' daily lives during their winter stay near the Pacific Ocean in 1805-06. Throughout the summer months, buckskin-clad rangers provide costumed demonstrations and other interpretive programs about the Lewis and Clark expedition.

The Saltworks Site in Seaside, Oregon, marks the location where members of the Expedition set up a camp and boiled seawater to obtain salt for use at the Fort and on the return journey.
