GETTING HERE

Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Historical Park is located in Woodstock, Vermont. Take I-89 to exit 1 (US 4). Follow US 4 west (13 miles) to Woodstock. Bear right onto VT 12 north (Pleasant St.). Continue on VT 12 by turning right onto Elm Street. Cross the iron bridge over the Ottauquechee River, bear right onto Old River Road, and take the first right into the parking lot at the Billings Farm & Museum.

WELCOME TO THE PARK

Begin at the Visitor Center at the Billings Farm & Museum. National Park staff are available to answer questions and help plan your visit. View the 30-minute award-winning film *A Place in the Land*. Follow the walking path across Elm Street to visit the Carriage Barn Visitor Center and all the offerings at the Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Historical Park.

ACCESSIBILITY

Public parking for disabled persons is available at the Billings Farm & Museum parking area. Both facilities are wheelchair accessible. Please ask park staff for assistance. For further information, call 802-457-3368 ext 22. American Sign Language interpretation is available by request; please give us at least 14 days notice so we may make arrangements.



Meet the Artists

Civil War Home Front



See what life was like on the home front during the Civil War in Woodstock. Included are places associated with the Underground Railroad, abolition meetings, the town's free African-American community, and Woodstock's pivotal role in the Union war effort in Vermont. This tour offers a deeper understanding of the far-reaching effects of the Civil War on the role of women, the meaning of citizenship, and the beginnings of land conservation.




New App for the iPhone

Massachusetts 54th Regiment Commemoration at Saint-Gaudens National Historic Site



The 54th was the first African American regiment recruited during the Civil War. On July 18, 1863 the regiment, led by Colonel Shaw, attacked Fort Wagner and suffered heavy losses. The Shaw Memorial is a masterpiece of sculptor, Augustus Saint-Gaudens, marking the event.

Hidden Spaces, Unique Places — Discover the park's distinctive historic buildings with their unusual architectural styles and interesting histories. Learn about the variety of strategies and techniques to preserve these landmark structures on this sneakpeak walking tour through seldom-seen building interiors and exteriors. \$



Green Energy Showcase — Get a behind-the-scenes look at the park's "green" technologies on this 1-hour walking tour. Included on this easy walk are a high efficiency wood boiler, hybrid cars, solar panels, a composting site, and our Platinum LEED certified Forest Center. Learn high- and low-tech solutions that you can use at home.

Lost Big Trees — Americans are fascinated by the big trees of the west. But here in the east we have our own big trees: white pine, elms, hemlocks, and the American chestnut. This 1½-hour program explores the history, ecology, and future of the big eastern trees.



Gardens In Bloom —

Explore the park's colorful gardens on this short 1-hour walk. More than beautiful scenery, this landscape reflects layers of careful design that are linked to the conservation movement in the 19th century.







Fallout — The Cold War spurred proliferation of technologies with the power of vast destructiveness, and in its shadow a new environmental consciousness emerged. Go back in time with dramatic historic news reels and movie clips to explore this pivotal time. A highlight of the program is a tour of a fully-stocked 1960s-era fallout shelter. \$

Spirituality & the Environment — This 1½-hour walking tour will explore ways faith has informed stewardship practice and the appreciation of nature. The tour includes a closer look at the original Hudson River School paintings inside the Mansion. \$

America's Best Idea — Join us on National Park Service Founders Day. Tell us about your favorite park and why parks are important to you. Explore some of the "untold stories" from the Ken Burns series, *The National Parks: America's Best Idea*.

Become an I-Naturalist — Flowers, trees, amphibians, butterflies, oh my! Step outside and start recording the fascinating world around you, and share your observations with a growing network of "citizen scientists." Curiosity required, no experience necessary. Meets at the Forest Center.

Horse-logging Demonstration — Visit a horse-logging site in action and learn about the 150-year legacy of forestry on Mount Tom. Explore the process from trees to boards — how trees are marked and harvested and the various ways wood is used in our daily lives.



Appalachian Trails and Tales — Extending from Maine to Georgia, the Appalachian Trail is one of the greatest examples of citizen stewardship. Join a ranger on a 3-hour hike to explore a section of the AT and the history that shaped this landscape. Meet at the Billings Farm & Museum Visitor Center. Moderate to Difficult, 3 miles.

Warblers, Woods, and Watersheds — Keeping tabs on the ecological conditions of the park (along with 11 other regional parks) is the mission of the NPS Northeast Temperate Network. Join NETN staff for this 2-hour hike to try your hand at the basics of monitoring birds, salamanders, forest health, and water quality. Meet at Prosper parking lot. Moderate, 3 miles.

The Future of the Forest — Join us for a hike exploring the history and stewardship of the oldest professionally-managed forest in the United States. During this 2-hour hike, see some of the most unique parts of the park and visits stands with active forestry. Meet at Prosper parking lot. Moderate, 3 miles.

Fall Foliage Walk — View vibrant autumn foliage in this 2-hour ranger-led walk along historic carriage roads while learning about the story of the Mount Tom Forest. Meet at the Carriage Barn Visitor Center. Easy, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.
