Manhattan Project History in February

- Philip Abelson began working on uranium enrichment using liquid thermal diffusion in February of 1941. However construction of his thermal diffusion plant in Philadelphia did not begin until January 1944. This same process would be used later at the S-50 plant in Oak Ridge, TN.
- Glenn Seaborg and his research group discovered Plutonium while working at the University of California, Berkeley on February 24, 1941.
- Construction of the Y-12 Uranium enrichment facilities and the X-10 Graphite Reactor began in February 1943. Stone and Webster Engineering was in charge of Y-12 construction while DuPont handled X-10.
- One year after construction Y-12 sent 200 grams of uranium-235 to Los Alamos, NM in February 1944.
- Los Alamos received their first shipment of plutonium from the Hanford site on February 2, 1945. Five months later the Trinity test took place.
