January Dates in MAPR History

- Niels Bohr officially announced, on January 26, 1939, the discovery of fission at an international conference at George Washington University in Washington, DC.
- President Franklin Delano Roosevelt approved the production of an atomic bomb on January 19, 1942. Construction in Oak Ridge started the next month.
- General Groves selected Hanford, WA as the site for plutonium production on January 16, 1943.
- On January 1, 1947 the Atomic Energy Commission took responsibility for complete control of the plants, laboratories, equipment, and personnel assembled to produce the atomic bomb.

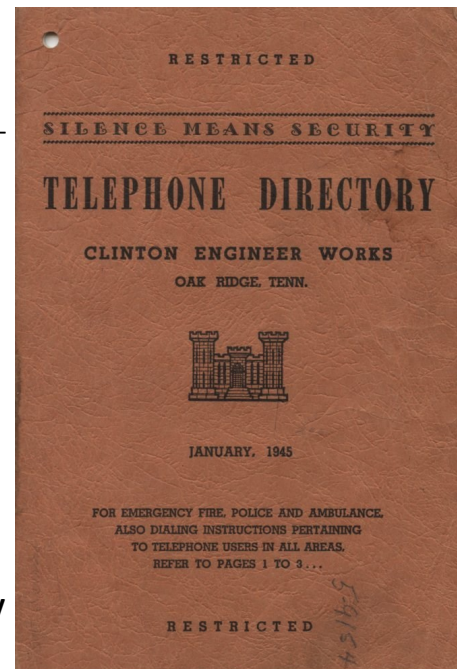
A mural by Gale Hinton at the Children's Museum of Oak Ridge celebrates the national parks.
