
## **January Dates in MAPR History**

 Niels Bohr officially announced, on January 26, 1939, the discovery of fission at an international conference at George Washington University in Washington, DC.

President Franklin Delano Roosevelt approved the pro-

duction of an atomic bomb on January 19, 1942. Construction in Oak Ridge started the next month.

 General Groves selected Hanford, WA as the site for plutonium production on January 16, 1943. Training Opportunity for Volunteers.
