Visitor Activities National Park Service U.S. Department of the Interior Mesa Verde National Park October 20, 2019 to April 11, 2020 Late fall, winter, and early spring is a wonderful time to visit Mesa Verde National Park, Welcome and there are many activities available to help you experience this special place. Enjoy a variety of cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, and hiking opportunities in a quiet winter environment. Step back in time and drive the Mesa Top Loop Road to explore 700 years of Ancestral Pueblo history; visit the Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum to see a turkey-feather boot worn long ago; and view Spruce Tree House surrounded by autumn colors, winter snow, or the early blooms of spring. Check the park website at www.nps.gov/meve for more information. Winter Logistics All activities depend on road, trail, and weather conditions. Please check with a ranger before beginning any of the listed activities. We recommend good hiking boots or snow boots, warm layered clothing, a hat, gloves, snacks, sunglasses, and water. Guide booklets are available at the Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum and at sites along the Mesa Top Loop Road. Limited food service is available at the Spruce Tree Terrace, near the Museum. Check Visitor Services on the back page for hours. There is no overnight camping or lodging in the park, but accommodations are available in nearby communities. For additional park information, tune your radio to AM 1610. Visitor and The Mesa Verde Visitor and Research Center is **Research Center** located at the park entrance and serves as the park's primary facility for orienting visitors to opportunities within the park and surrounding area. It also houses a state-of-the-art research and storage facility for the park's archives and museum collection of over three million objects. Open daily except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day. *Please stop by the the Visitor and Research Center to pay your entrance fee and support your park. Welcome Plaza, Mesa Verde Visitor and Research Center **Chapin Mesa Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum and Store** will help you gain insights into the lives of the Archeological Ancestral Pueblo people. The Museum is located Museum 20 miles (33 km) south of the park entrance. A 25-minute park video is shown every half hour or upon request. Open daily except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day. Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum View Spruce Tree House **Spruce Tree House** is Mesa Verde's best-preserved cliff dwelling. Although Spruce Tree House is currently *closed* due to the continuing threat of rockfall, you can observe the cliff dwelling from viewpoints near

the Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum. The trail to the lower viewpoint is short but steep, and can be icy.

Explore On Your Own	<u>Mesa Top Loop Road</u> is a 6-mile (10 km) drive through 700 years of Ancestral Pueblo history. Along the road, you'll find short, easily-accessible paved trails to view archeological sites, including surface sites and cliff dwelling overlooks. (During snow storms, the loop may briefly close until the road and walkways are cleared.) Open daily 8:00 am to sunset.	Amphiltheater
	Petroglyph Point Trail is located near the Chapin Mesa Archeological Museum. The 2.4-mile (3.9 km) trail leads to a panel of petroglyphs. In clear weather, the trail can be hiked as a loop. However, due to ice and snow, you may be directed to hike via the mesa top section of the trail, or the entire trail may be closed. Ask a ranger at the Museum for trail conditions and to register for the hike.
