The free flowing stretches of the Missouri still exhibit the river's dynamic character in its islands, bars, chutes, and snags. The Missouri National Recreational River, totaling 98 miles, includes a 39 mile section of the Missouri River from Fort Randall Dam east to the headwaters of Lewis and Clark Lake, and a 59 mile section from Gavins Point Dam, near Yankton, South Dakota, to Ponca, Nebraska. *These units are in the planning stage. Most of the land along the river is privately owned. Please respect the landowners' rights.*

- LOCATION:** North central - north eastern Nebraska, south eastern South Dakota, via major state roadways.
- VISITOR
ACTIVITIES:** No National Park Service facilities. The U.S. Army Corp of Engineers, along with state, local, and private facilities provide river access, interpretive activities, camping, and lodging at various points on the recreational river.
- FEES:** Some of the facilities have fees; check with the managing agency or owner.
- CAMPING &
LODGING:** Available at key points near the river through Corps of Engineers facilities, state and local parks and private operations.
