13 DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, EXTANT EQUIPMENT, AND IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC.

Wood frame, one-story, one-room, rectangular trail shelter; saltbox (lean-to) gable roof extends over log post and beam front "veranda"; cedar shake roof rests on whole log purlins with whittled ends; whole log exterior-interior walls; corner saddle notching; no chinking; log sill foundation; l" x 7" interior vertical wood platform; earth floor.

Prior to 1920, there were very few shelters for backcountry hikers and park rangers. Superintendent Toll (1919-20) stressed the need for a string of trail shelters to be placed ten to fifteen miles apart on the popular Wonderland Trail. Toll's system evolved into the construction of both patrol cabins and trail shelters under Superintendent O. A. Tomlinson's administration (1923-41). By 1924, there were seven known trail shelters in the park. One was located at Golden Lakes in Sunset Park (Thompson 1981). This pre-1924 shelter must have been demolished, however, for the Superintendent's monthly report of October, 1931, stated that a trail shelter had been constructed at Sunset Park the previous month.

This trail shelter is suffering from extensive log deterioration, especially on the lower base logs and at the corner notches. The environment is generally wet and muddy, making for damp conditions in and around the shelter most of the year. The deteriorating log sills have sunk below the ground level.



The structure measures $17'6" \times 20'4"$ (16'6" without porch). The front facade opening is $6' \times 6.5'$. The height of the front "veranda" is 5'8". A 4'4" x 17'6" interior wood platform spans the entire width of the shelter.

16. Significance

The structure is one of the oldest backcountry shelters in the park. It was one of the numerous trail shelters constructed on the popular Wonderland Trail, a policy begun under Superintendent Roger W. Toll (1919-20) and expanded during the superintendency of Major O. A. Tomlinson (1923-41).


