Other Points of Interest: Both the Washington Metrobus (fare is 40¢ within the district, 50¢ during rush hours) and the new Metro Subway Systems provide easy transportation to nearby attractions. Bus fare must be paid in exact change. Subway fare cards are available at the stations.

Anacostia Neighborhood Museum: Take bus #A2, A4 or A8 from 10th St. N.W. north of Constitution Ave. Get off at Martin Luther King Ave. and Talbert St. Walk one block south on Talbert St. Riding time is approximately 25 minutes.

Arlington National Cemetery: Take bus #7 westbound from 7th St. S.W. at Independence Ave. or pick up the same westbound bus at 15th St. N.W. on Constitution Ave. Get off at Arlington National Cemetery. Riding time is approximately 15 minutes.

Georgetown: Take bus #30, 32, 34 or 36 westbound from 7th St. S.W. at Independence Ave. or pick up the same westbound bus along Pennsylvania Ave. Get off at M St. and Wisconsin Ave. Riding time is approximately 25 minutes.

Kennedy Center: Take bus #70, 72 or 74 north on 7th St. at Constitution or Independence Ave. to H St. N.W. Transfer to #80 or 81 west on H St. to Kennedy Center. Riding time is approximately 20 minutes.

Museum of African Art: Take bus #70, 72 or 74 north on 7th St. to F St. Transfer to #40 or 42 east on F St. Get off at East Capitol St. and 3rd St. S.E. The museum is one block south on A St. N.E. Riding time is approximately 15 minutes.

National Arboretum: Take bus #70, 72 or 74 north on 7th St. at Independence or Constitution Ave. to H St. N.W. Transfer to #X8 east on H St. Get off at 21st St. N.E. and Maryland Ave. Walk north on 21st St. to M St. Turn right to Arboretum entrance on 28th St. Riding time is approximately 25 minutes.

National Geographic Explorers Hall: Take bus #S2 or S4 northbound on 12th St. N.W. at Pennsylvania Ave. Get off at 16th St. and M St. Walk one block west on M St. to 17th St. Riding time is approximately 10 minutes.

National Zoological Park: Take bus #L2, L4 or L6 northbound on 13th St. N.W. at Pennsylvania Ave. Get off at the Zoo entrance on Connecticut Ave. between Hawthorne St. and Devonshire Place. Riding time is approximately 30 minutes.

Phillips Collection: Take bus #L2, L4 or L6 northbound on 13th St. N.W. at Pennsylvania Ave. Get off at 20th St. N.W. and Massachusetts Ave. The Museum is one block north at Q St. and 21st St. Riding time is approximately 15 minutes.

R.F.K. Stadium: Take bus #70, 72 or 74 north on 7th St. to F St. Transfer to #40 or 42 east on F St. Get off on East Capitol St. at the stadium entrance. Riding time is approximately 20 minutes.

Union Station—National Visitor Center: Take bus #70, 72 or 74 north on 7th St. to F St. Transfer to #40 or 42 east on F St. Get off at Union Station—National Visitor Center. Riding time is approximately 15 minutes.

Shuttle Bus to National Portrait Gallery and National Collection of Fine Arts

Jefferson Memorial: This marble and limestone building was dedicated in 1943 to the memory of Thomas Jefferson. The rotunda contains a 19-foot (6 meter) bronze statue of Jefferson and carved excerpts from his writings. Admission is free. Open 8 AM to Midnight everyday.

Freer Gallery of Art: Houses one of the world's most distinguished collections of Oriental art, as well as paintings and drawings by 19th and early 20th century American artists including James McNeill Whistler. 10 AM to 5:30 PM everyday. Closed December 25.

Smithsonian Institution Building: The Smithsonian was created by an act of Congress in 1846. The original building, now known as the Castle, is the administrative headquarters and principal visitor information center. 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

Arts and Industries Building: This second building of the Smithsonian Institution, completed in 1881, was restored in 1975 and contains exhibits recalling the Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition of 1876. 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden: Opened in 1974 and devoted primarily to American and European art of the past 100 years, the Museum supplements its own collections with frequent loan exhibits of contemporary painting and sculpture. 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

National Air and Space Museum: Among highlights are the original Wright 1903 "Flyer," Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis," the Apollo 11 Command Module, and Skylab, along with a Spacearium and the spectacular film "To Fly." 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

United States Botanic Garden: Popular displays include some 10,000 orchid plants and four seasonal presentations: an Azalea Show, the Easter Spring Show, the Chrysanthemum Show, and the Poinsettia Show. 9 AM to 5 PM (winter). 9 AM to 7 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

United States Capitol: Highlights include the Rotunda, Statuary Hall, the original Senate and Supreme Court chambers, and the House and Senate Galleries. 9 AM to 4:30 PM (winter). Central portion to 10 PM (summer). Closed December 25, January 1, and Thanksgiving Day.

Lincoln Memorial: Focal point of the marble and limestone memorial, begun in 1914, is the 19-foot (6 meter) marble statue of a seated Abraham Lincoln by Daniel Chester French. The Gettysburg Address is carved in the Memorial's walls. Admission is free. Open 8 AM to Midnight everyday.

Constitution Gardens: A six-acre lake with an island and approximately two miles of walks and bike paths are among the attractions of Constitution Gardens, a forty-five acre sylvan retreat featuring thousands of trees and flowering shrubs. Always open.

The White House: Since 1800, The White House has been the home and office of the President of the United States. State rooms feature superb American antiques, predominantly of the late 18th and early 19th centuries. Admission free. 10 AM to Noon Tuesday through Friday; Saturday to 1 PM. Closed July 4, Thanksgiving Day, December 25, January 1, and for official functions.

Renwick Gallery of the National Collection of Fine Arts: A national showcase of past and present American creativity in design, crafts, and the decorative arts, the Gallery also contains an Octagon Room and a Grand Salon furnished in the styles of the 1860's-1870's. 10 AM to 5:30 PM everyday. Closed December 25.

Corcoran Gallery of Art

Washington Monument: Built to memorialize the first President, the Monument is the tallest structure in the city, rising 555 feet 5 1/8 inches (169.29 meter) (897 steps). Access to the top is by elevator, for which persons 16 years and older are charged a 10-cent fee. 9 AM to 5 PM (winter). 8 AM to Midnight (summer).

National Museum of History and Technology: Exhibits cover national, military and cultural history, and the history of science and technology. Highlighted are The Star-Spangled Banner, First Ladies' gowns and American inventions and achievements. 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

National Museum of Natural History and National Museum of Man: Moon rocks, dinosaurs, an insect zoo and the Hope Diamond are among exhibits which also include displays on man's cultures, ecology, archeology, mammals, birds and life in the sea. 10 AM to 5:30 PM (winter). 10 AM to 9 PM (summer). Closed December 25.

National Archives: The original Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights are on permanent display. Changing exhibits include historic documents of all kinds. 9 AM to 6 PM Monday through Saturday, 1 PM to 6 PM Sunday (winter). To 10 PM everyday (summer). Closed December 25, January 1.

National Portrait Gallery: Devoted to the study and exhibition of portraits of individuals who have contributed significantly to American history, the Gallery is noted for its presidential portraits and its special exhibitions. 10 AM to 5:30 PM everyday. Closed December 25.

National Collection of Fine Arts: Holdings include more than 17,000 works of American art ranging from the 18th century to the present. The museum displays temporary exhibitions and selections from its permanent collections. 10 AM to 5:30 PM everyday. Closed December 25.

National Gallery of Art: Contains one of the world's finest collections of European and American painting, sculpture, and graphic arts from the 13th century to the present. Also offers major international loan exhibitions. 10 AM to 5 PM Monday through Saturday (winter), to 9 PM (summer). Noon to 9 PM every Sunday. Closed December 25, January 1.
