




Introduction

The Sangre de Cristo National Heritage Area (SdCNHA) tells stories of the people, culture, and environment of more than 3,000 square miles of the upper headwaters of the Rio Grande in Coloraodo's San Luis Valley. It is among the most unique and well-preserved cultural landscapes in the nation, with stunning, beautiful natural resources and a rich mixture of historic and diverse settlements. The three southern counties of the San Luis Valley: Alamosa, Conejos, and Costilla form the core of the heritage area all knit together by the Rio Grande. The Rio Grande's and its intricate network of tributary creeks, lakes, wetlands, artesian springs, and acequias.

National Heritage Areas (NHAs) are designated by Congress as places where natural, cultural, and historical resources combine to form a cohesive, nationally important landscapes. President Ronald Reagan supported the concept of National Heritage Areas as a cost-effective way to tell America's story and conserve the nations natural and historic resources. Former Secretary of Interior Ken Salazar, former Congressman John Salazar, and Senator Michael Bennet played a critical role in establishing Colorado's three National Heritage Areas in 2009. Historic Preservation through the Sangre de Cristo National Heritage Area has created jobs, stabilized historic districts, assisted in heritage tourism, and contributed to rural economic development plans.

SdCNHA and Discovery Road are proud to share accounts of the contributions made by Japanese communities in the San Luis Valley of Southern Colorado. Using historic images, interviews, and original research they are proud to present the half-hour documentary episode "Saving History".



The Congreso de Acequias is a unique event which brings together the acequia(earthen ditches) community each year to celebrate and strengthen Colorado's oldest farming communities. Acequias are a critical piece of the Heritage Area's living history, supporting the ancestors of those who settled under the Mexican land grants. The 2021 Congreso gave community members an opportunity to participate in the living history of the Acequia Community. It also provided critical water rights information to irrigators, as well as the opportunity to learn cropping types, estate planning, and the protection of an individual acequia through by-laws.



SdCNHA collaborated with the Salazar Rio Grande Del Norte Center, SLV GO!, and the Bureau of Land Management working together to produce interpretive signage for the Rio Grande Natural Area. This general area is where Don Diego de Vargas, the Spanish Governor of colonial New Mexico, made the earliest documented entrance into present day Colorado in 1694. The Rio Grande Natural Area possesses many other significant histories, vast landscapes, and rich culture.

Caminos del Valle



The Sangre de Cristo National Heritage Area assisted in supporting, Caminos del Valle, a local youth-lead walking program. The project recruited, trained, and developed a cohort of youth leaders from Alamosa, Costilla, and Conejos County. With these acquired skills, the youth hosted tours that focused on cultural heritage, history, public lands, local traditions and more.

Local Curricula



SdCNHA has partnered with Adams State University and University of Colorado at Boulder to assist local educators in creating curricula in line with Colorado State standards that focus on the local culture, history, and heritage within the SdCNHA.

Scholarships



SdCNHA is proud to provide annual scholarships to students who particiapte in the District History Fair. Eligible student projects must be based on a theme involving local history, culture, or traditions within SdCNHA.
