# UNIFORMS AND INSIGNIA PRELIMINARY INVENTORY

#### A. Provenance

Much of the material in the uniform boxes came from Jack Williams who wrote a brief history of the NPS uniform, badges and insignia in 1968. The rest has been gathered piecemeal, without any large accession. "Current" material such as the R&R Uniforms Catalog will continue to be added when available.

# B. History

Jack Williams' unpublished History of the NPS Uniform, Badges, and Insignia, written in 1968, is the standard work. A copy of his manuscript is available. Evidently the first uniforms came into use in 1911 through the efforts of Major W. R. Logan, Superintendent of Glacier National Park. Mark Daniels, General Superintendent of National Parks designed and wore the first regular uniform in 1914. With the establishment of the NPS, a uniform committee, chaired by Superintendent W. B. Lewis of Yosemite, was formed. Through its efforts by 1919 the standard uniform consisted of stiff brim hat, blouse, green riding breeches, shirt, and either boots or shoes with puttees.

Embroidered cloth sleeve patches were worn on the uniform from 1920-1925. Length of service stripes were also worn. In the 20s a gold star for ten years service was authorized but by 1933 it was replaced by a silver star for each five years. These stripes and stars continued to be worn on the lower sleeve until 1957. Collar ornaments have been worn since 1919 and the buttons have had a design since 1912. The previous year (1911) the first badge was adopted although scout badges had been worn in Yellowstone since 1894. A two-piece badge was in use from 1921 to 1928. Officials had round badges while those of rangers were shield-shaped. distinctions continued when the single piece badge was adopted in 1930. Trousers were approved in 1935 but breeches continued to be worn until 1947. Grey shirts with pleat pockets and shoulder straps also became official in the mid-30s. The 1935 standards gave Washington Office employees permission to wear "civilian" clothes. Prior to this eveyone, even women, wore the same uniform.

World War II saw many more women employed and they began to wear green skirts. The 1947 option for women includes skirts and

Women's Army Corps-type coats. After the war, all men wore trousers and the shield badge became curved rather than flat. A big distinction was added in the mid-50s when the NPS arrowhead, first used in 1954, was authorized as a shoulder patch. The women's uniform of skirt, white blouse, jacket and hat patterned after the airline stewardesses of the 40s, finally became "regulation" in 1959 having been worn since the war. The next year (1960) saw the "officials" give up their round badges. All badges were changed to have the eagle face the other way and the inscription now said either "National Park Ranger" or "National Park Service".

The departmental seal was changed in 1968. As worn on the ranger badge it had a small circle and 11 small triangles framed by a stylized pair of hands. This was not well-liked and in 1970 reverted to a more traditional buffalo, mountains, and rising sun. The women moved away from tradition in 1970 and were authorized new outfits of beige double knit polyester which were worn in the field from 1971 to 1974. The color was then changed to green but the women's uniform were still polyester. This uniform was not considered practical. By 1980, men and women were wearing the same outfit (with modifications) standardized in 1919.

# C. Summary

There are two boxes of materials pertinent to uniforms. One contains the standards and the photos while the other has folders, articles, catalogues, etc.

## D. Dispersal

The uniforms themselves are in the museum collection. Catalog Numbers 2-51, 118-203, 211-214, 240-339, 346-351, 361-364, 377-386, 388-391, 450-452, and 568 are either uniforms or uniform paraphernalia. In addition there are several "extra" shirts, dresses, jackets, skirts, etc., that are not catalogued but are listed with a reference to the catalogued item.

The periodicals, especially <u>In Touch</u> and the <u>Courier</u> contain many references to and pictures of the uniforms. Also some of the books refer to the uniform. Occasionally the oral history interviewee will mention what he or she wore.

Many of the portraits in the Portrait File were taken in uniform. The slide collection has another set of the "uniform show." Some of Albright's films include rangers in uniform. The Springfield Collection is a rich source for photos.
