Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore was authorized by Public Law 89-668 passed by Congress on October 15, 1966. The Lakeshore was formally dedicated on October 5, 1972. The Lakeshore is located in Alger County, within Michigan's First Congressional District.

The Lakeshore is managed in two zones for a total of 73,235 acres (114.5 square miles). The Shoreline Zone is owned by the National Park Service and includes 33,929 acres. The Inland Buffer Zone is a mixture of State of Michigan, Forestland Group, and other private lands encompassing 39,306 acres.

Most of park lands drain into the Lake Superior watershed. Within the Lake Superior watershed are Munising Falls Creek, Miners River, Bridalveil Creek, Beaver Creek, Mosquito, Hurricane, Sevenmile Creek, Chapel River, Spray Creek, Sullivan's Creek, and Sable Creek.
