## Dear Sir:

Aside from your questionnaire, I would like to patition your attention to gain interest in what I consider a public service.

I have been taking colored pictures of the flowers in and around Plumas County. My mora was greatly aided by an area in Plumas County near Quincy that is a Botanic wonder, and I feel that it should be set aside for either a State Park or a National Monument.

The area is called a Darlingtonia area, in honor of the Cobra Plant —
Darlingtonia Californicus, which grows there in abundance. There are
also 30 to 35 varieties of flowered plants blooming from spring to fall,
several ordids, iris, various lilies, ferns, gentians, composites,
where plants, and many trees, surchs and grasses. In the whole of the
United States there are only a few such areas, surel, none with the particular combination of plants and flowers that grow in this one, and so far as 'I know, none have as yet been set aside for botannical study by the State
or Mational Governments.

The reason that it should be preserved, aside from the very wonder and beauty of the spot, is that I have noticed in the few years I have known of its existence, the plants have been trampled and dug for transplanting, which seldem is successful — I fear for its servival. The area is endangered by the usual progress of civilization and recreationists. I have talked to numerous people here in Quincy, and every one is most interested in preserving the area. I would be able to obtain a signed petition for a State Park or Monument if that would help. The area would cover 10 acres at the most.

This unique area would be of benefit and enjoyment of tourists, college students interested in plant life, and botanists from all over the country.

Thank you for your attention. I would appreciate learning from you as to what assistance or suggestions you can give toward setting aside this area as a National Monument or Park.
