Resolution passed by the League of Women Voters of the Menominee Tribe of Indians, Wisconsin.

Whereas, it has come to the attention of this Menominee Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin that there is being considerable agitation and influence brought to bear by some of our Congressmen and others outside the reservation to take away from the Menominee Tribe of Indians a large portion of their reservation for the purpose of converting it into a national park; and whereas the said Menominee Tribe of Indians are most emphatically opposed to any legislation that will in any way deplete or take away from them any part of their reservation for the purpose of converting it into a national park, or any other purpose. And

Whereas, the said Menominee Tribe of Indians are much worked up and in a state of excitement and fear lest they may soon be deprived of their rights and peaceable possessions of their present reservation and thus be deprived of the right to far, fish, and hunt, and roam as they now do on their said reservation. And

Whereas, it is imperative that some action be taken at this time to relieve the minds of the said Menominee Indians and to assure them that no part of their reservation will be taken from them by undue or arbitrary act of law. Now therefore

Be it resolved by the League of Women Voters of the Menominee Tribe of Indians on the Menominee Reservation of Wisconsin that the said Menominee Tribe of Indians, do through its League of Women Voters, hereby, as a whole

Most emphatically know that the said Menominee Tribe of Indians are unanimously opposed to any legislation by Congress that will take from them in any way, shape, or manner any part of their reservation either for a national park or for any other purposes any part of their reservation.

Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Commissioner of Indian Affairs, the Secretary of the Interior and to each Senator interested in Indian welfare throughout the United States with the prayer that they and each of them use their good influence in prohibiting the passage by Congress of any act that may tend to take away any portion of said Menominee reservation from said Menominee Tribe of Indians in Wisconsin.
