RULES FOR KONANE

Equipment: A game board (papamu), 50 dark pieces (water worn lava pebbles),50 light pieces (water worn coral fragments)

Directions:

Fill all the holes alternately with the light and dark playing pieces.

The game is played by two players sitting opposite each other.

To start, one of the players picks up one pebble of each color in each hand and puts both his hands behind his back. The opponent chooses a hand and ends up selecting the color of both players game piece.

The player with the dark game piece always starts first. He removes one of his pieces, or men, from the center or one of the corners of the papamu, and gives that man to his opponent. The opponent removes one of his light pieces next to the empty hole of the starting player, and gives his light man to his opponent.


Now, there are two empty spaces next to each other. The player with the dark pebbles starts by jumping one of his pieces over one of the light men and removes it. The light player then jumps the dark man and removes it. The players continue to alternate.

All moves are made by jumping the opponent's men with one's own piece, and removing the opponent's men as they are jumped over.

In any move a player moves only one piece at a time, and in only one direction; he cannot make a move diagonally. A multiple jump is permitted provided it is made in one direction only.

As the game continues, there will be fewer and fewer pieces left on the papamu. Thus there will be fewer chances to make a jump. Finally, when one of the players finds he is unable to make a move, he has lost.
