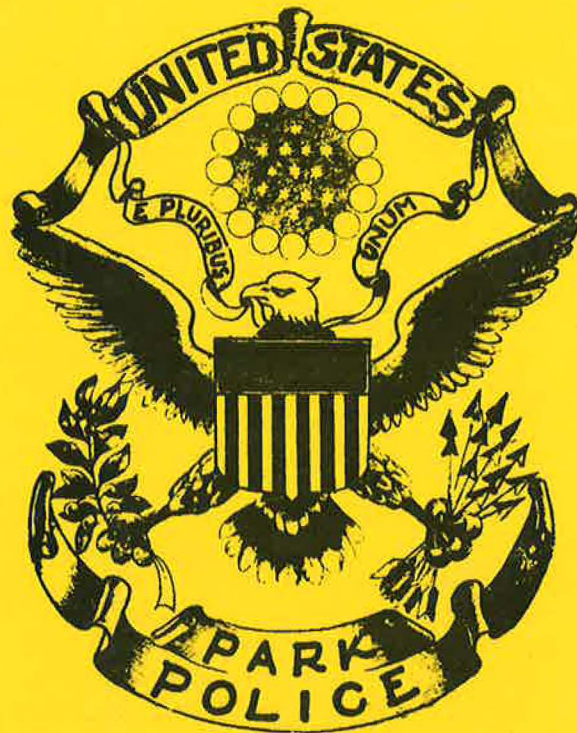

Memorandum

To: Regional Director
From: Chief, U. S. Park Police
Subject: Annual Report, 1966

The United States Park Police Force undertook several innovations during 1966 which substantially increased their capability to provide public services.

A new organizational structure was authorized and implemented which more closely aligns like functions of the Force and promotes better manpower utilization. Increased emphasis has been placed on the functions of protection, crime prevention, traffic safety and helpful public services.

The Greenbelt Sub-station was completed and occupied early in 1966, and serves very adequately as a base of operations for the patrolmen and also provides court room facilities for the United States Commissioner.

Increased use of park areas was accented by over 20 million visitations to the parks of the National Park Service, National Capital Region and has proportionately increased the workload of this Force. There were 688 special events held in park areas which required 24,303 man hours to provide the necessary police services.

We have continued to move forward in the field of professional training for policemen. In 1966, our recruit and in-service training programs were accelerated and upgraded. Thirty-four per cent of the Force participated in American University college courses. Graduates of our Recruit School are awarded three college credits by American University for successful completion of the course. Two college subjects taught in the course carry six additional credit hours, which brings the total credits of each graduate to nine. This is a good start towards an Associate Degree (60 hours) in Police Administration.

We are exploring new ideas and methods applicable to protection and law enforcement which may further assist us in maintaining a high standard of police service. The feasibility and application of automatic computers and closed circuit television are now being explored.

The Force has been assigned complete responsibility for the protection and security of the monuments and memorials in this Region. We believe that the number of policemen involved in this particular function can be substantially reduced with the use of electronic devices supported with mobile patrols and at the same time achieve a higher quality of protection.

We are most appreciative of the direction and support we have received from you and your staff and, particularly, from the Superintendents of the National Capital Parks with whom we are so closely associated.

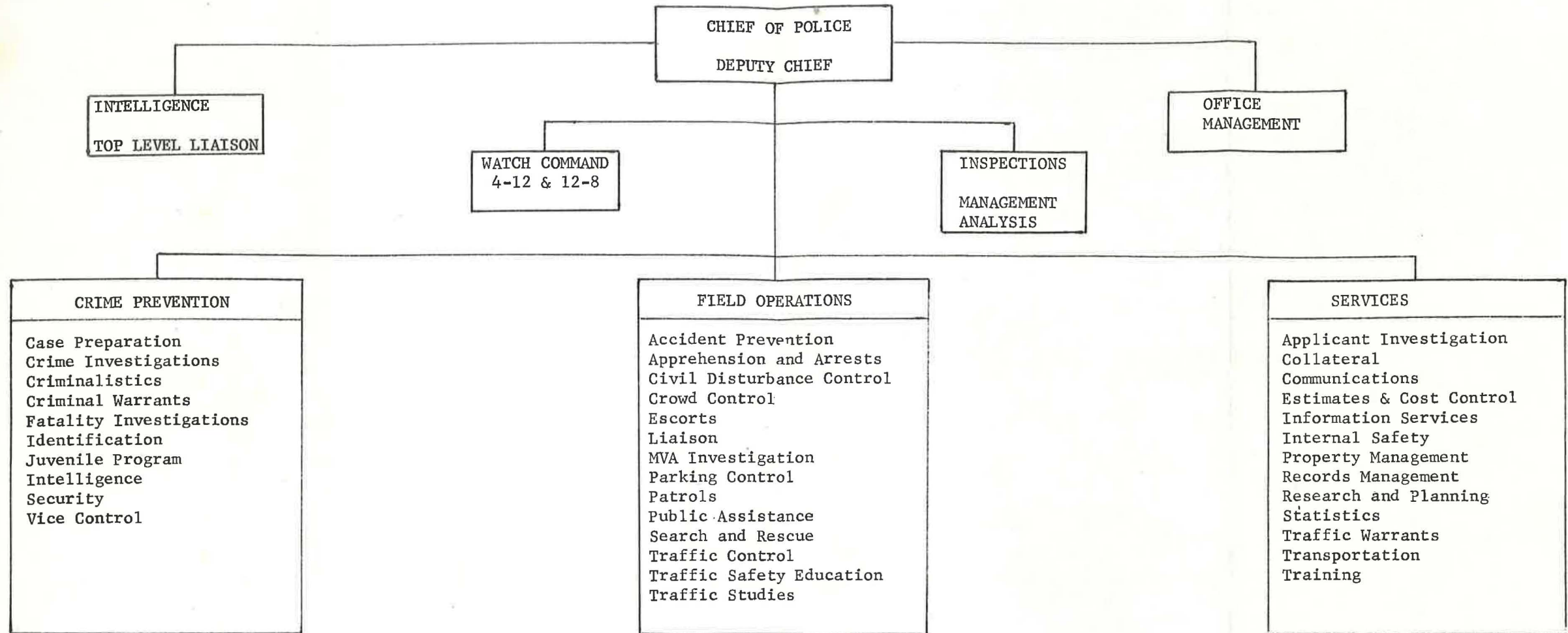

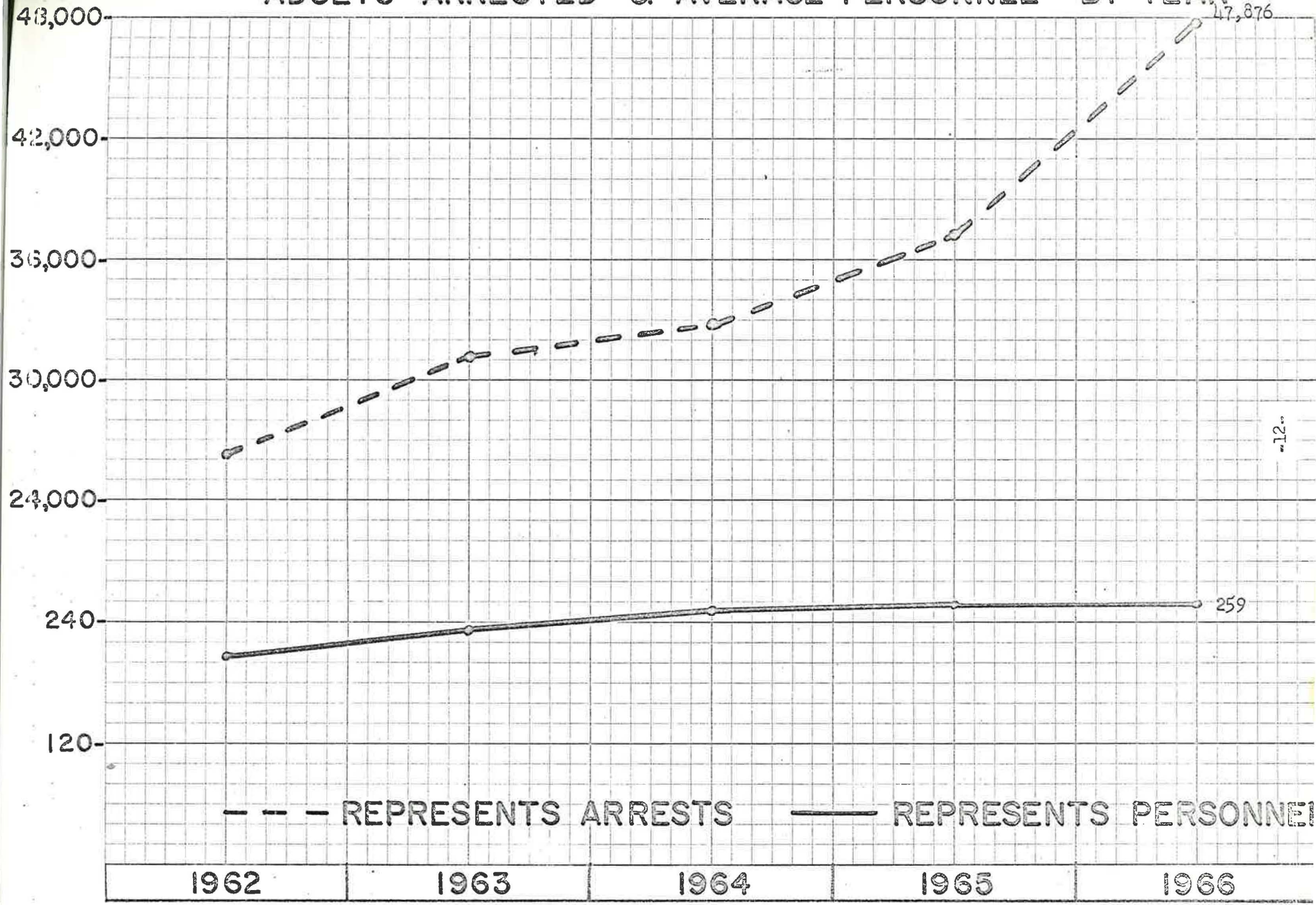

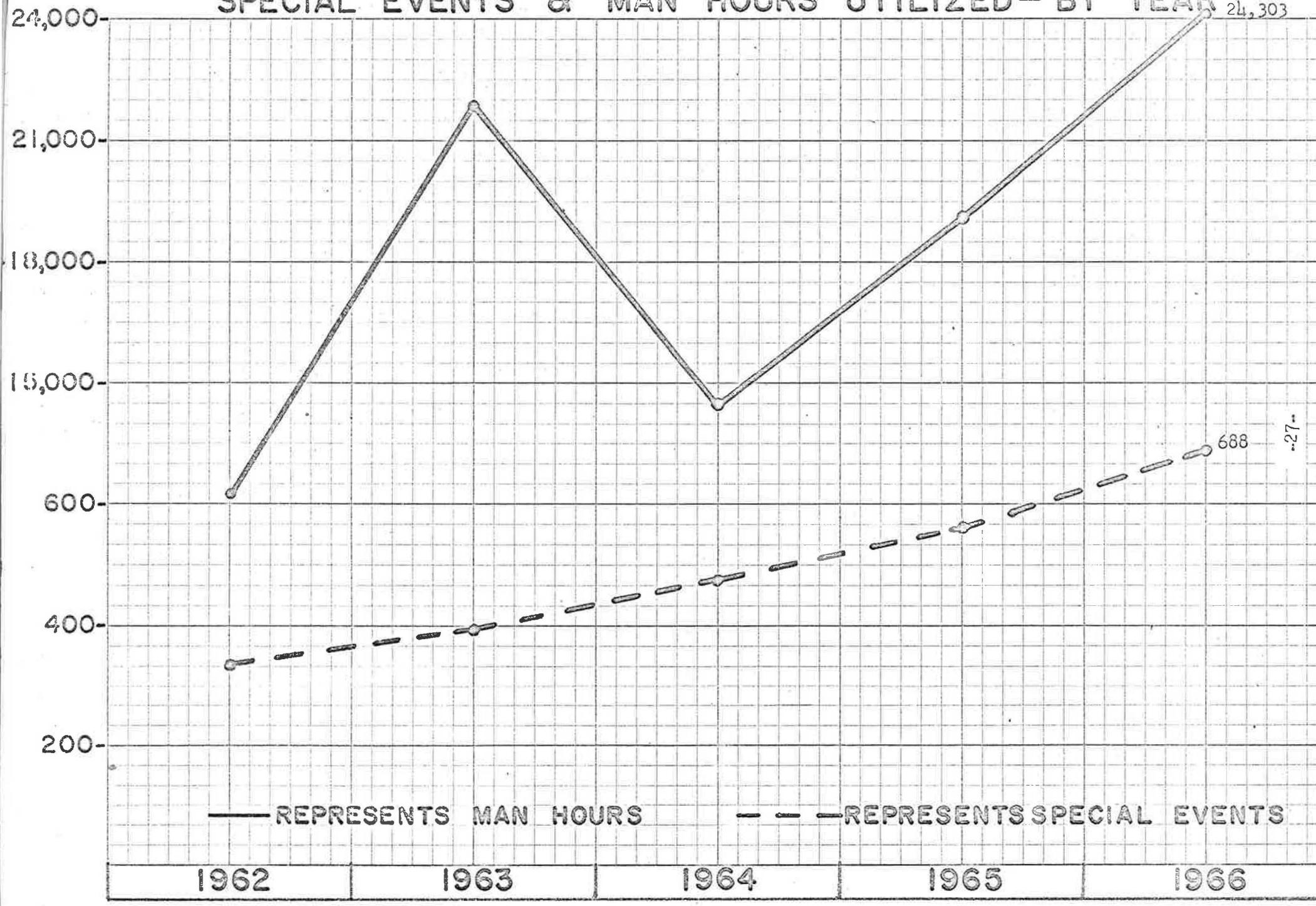
SPECIAL OCCASIONS AND EVENTS
