Subject: Annual Report for Calendar Year 1967

The purpose of this memorandum is to present the annual report of the United States Park Police for the calendar year 1967. Some of the important elements are summarized below.

The United States Park Police Force is responsible for providing protection and visitor services, prevention and detection of crime and enforcement of the park regulations and other applicable statutes in the Washington Metropolitan park areas of the National Capital Region, National Park Service. Providing protection, helpful services, reduction in crime and the traffic accident rate, and supervision of peak-hour traffic are among the major fundamental objectives of park police operations.

Total visitation in the National Capital Region has steadily increased over the last five years and has been estimated at 21,400,814 persons during 1967. Visitation at special events held within the Park System has been estimated at 3,117,891 persons. The volume of traffic using park roads has increased to an all-time high.

Total major criminal offenses reported increased 356 over the calendar year 1966, with 1,092 offenses reported for 1967 as opposed to 841 offenses for 1966. Part of this increase can be attributed to a better reporting system with use of machine records. It should be noted that in the area of serious crimes, less than half of the 1,092 offenses reported were crimes of violence against the person. The others were larceny offenses of various types including thefts from parked automobiles. Out of 53,886 major offenses reported by the police departments for the entire District of Columbia for 1967, only 918 of these were perpetrated within the National Capital Park System. While there was an increase in the number of serious crimes committed (including thefts), the total number of some 500 crimes against the person is less than one for each park reservation which we patrol in a very extensive geographical area situated within three jurisdictions.

Traffic accidents increased by 175 with 2,756 reported as opposed to 2,581 in 1966. Eleven traffic deaths were reported as opposed to 23 traffic deaths during the previous year which is a decrease of twelve. The traffic accident frequency rate for motorists using park roads is only slightly higher than the previous year, with a substantial reduction in the number of traffic deaths. Considering the increase in the use of park roads which causes added congestion, the accident frequency rate does not reflect a very significant rise.





There were 53,886 major offenses reported by the District of Columbia for 1967. Only 2% (or 918) of the total serious offenses reported in the District of Columbia occurred within the park system. The remaining 174 major offenses occurring in the park system were divided between Maryland and Virginia. (83 in Maryland and 91 in Virginia.)






Ice Skating On The C & O Canal




