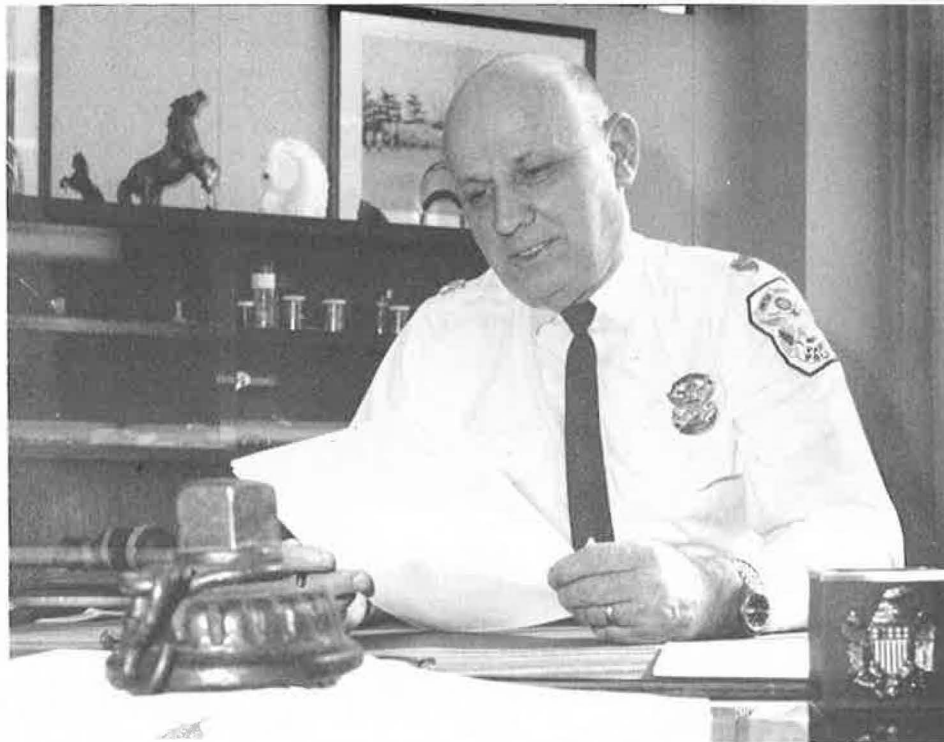

Subject: Annual Report 1971

In keeping with the progressive atmosphere and modern goals set forth by the National Park Service, the United States Park Police experienced several major changes in 1971 which have contributed greatly to our capabilities for providing public service.

A new organizational structure designed to insure good management and to accommodate our needs for maximum efficiency was authorized and implemented. Because of numerous requests for additional protection, and stepped-up park programs, the Force initiated decentralization to Supervisory Districts and a Substation operation. Through these efforts, we have provided closer liaison and service to the Park Superintendents and their respective areas of responsibility. In addition, the opportunity to provide professional police assistance throughout the country in the law enforcement program of the National Park Service was indeed one of the highlights of 1971.

The national trend to seek recreation and enjoyment in the park system has reached proportions which create an even greater demand upon the entire park service family and those dedicated to public service. The obligations of the Force for the protection and preservation of our historical treasures increase with each season. The dimensions of these demands and obligations are vividly reflected in the 37,631 service calls registered by the Force during 1971. Equally significant is the area of Special Events and Demonstrations, the most notable among these was the attempt to close down government installations during the May Day Activities. The Park Police provided assistance and protection for 3,104 special events which required 57,526 man-hours of police service.

Despite the rise in service calls and visitor use, it is most gratifying for me to report that Part I Offenses dropped to 1,017 cases compared to 1,334 for the previous year. With the exception of reported rapes, which increased from 26 in 1970 to a total of 40 in 1971, the remaining Part I Offenses such as Assault, Burglary and Petit Larceny show a significant decrease. Hopefully, we can attribute this decline to increased patrol activity and improved man power deployment.

Part II Offenses revealed an increase of 473 cases. (5,272 cases recorded in 1970 and 5,745 cases recorded in 1971). Of the sixteen major categories utilized for reporting Part II Offenses, a slight rise occurred in sex offenses and drunkenness. Vandalism, driving while drunk and disorderly conduct offenses display a decrease.


The number of reported motor vehicle accidents occurring in the National Capital Parks area rose to 3,516. This number reflects an increase of 135 motor vehicle accidents over the previous year. As a result, there were 27 fatalities, 6 of which were pedestrians. Personal injuries caused by these accidents showed a slight decrease (57 injuries) from 905 injuries in 1970 to 848 injuries in 1971.

The Horse Mounted Patrol and Dog Service Units provided a record number of demonstrations for various clubs, school groups and community sponsored organizations. With this program, numerous positive contacts have been made with thousands of youngsters in the metropolitan area. These demonstrations are in great demand and the Force plans to schedule as many future programs as possible. Another rewarding experience has been the commendatory response received from citizens who have invited members of the Force to speak at meetings and gatherings about specific problems, mainly drug abuse, or general discussion on how to solidify relations and cooperative programs.

Recognition of the incentives gained from the field of education has directed us to take advantage of the many training opportunities available to the Force. Several important phases of this training included, 260 Park Policemen who received a minimum of 40 hours in-service training, 130 members were engaged in supervisory-management courses and training offered by other government and law enforcement agencies. In addition, participation in college level programs in the Police Science category has continued on the up-swing.

Our authorized strength at the termination of the reporting year was 439 police officers, 30 civilian employees and 27 uniformed guards. During 1971, the Force attracted in excess of 4,000 employment inquiries. Civil Service reported administering examinations to 734 applicants of which 286 were certified as eligibles. Ninety new members joined the Force from the Civil Service register in 1971.

We sincerely appreciate the leadership, assistance and support that the Park Police have received from you and all members of the NCP team. Through our deeds and by our demeanor, reinforced by a constant probe for new and improved techniques and the firm foundation of your guidance, we hope to maintain a high level in future performance and public service.

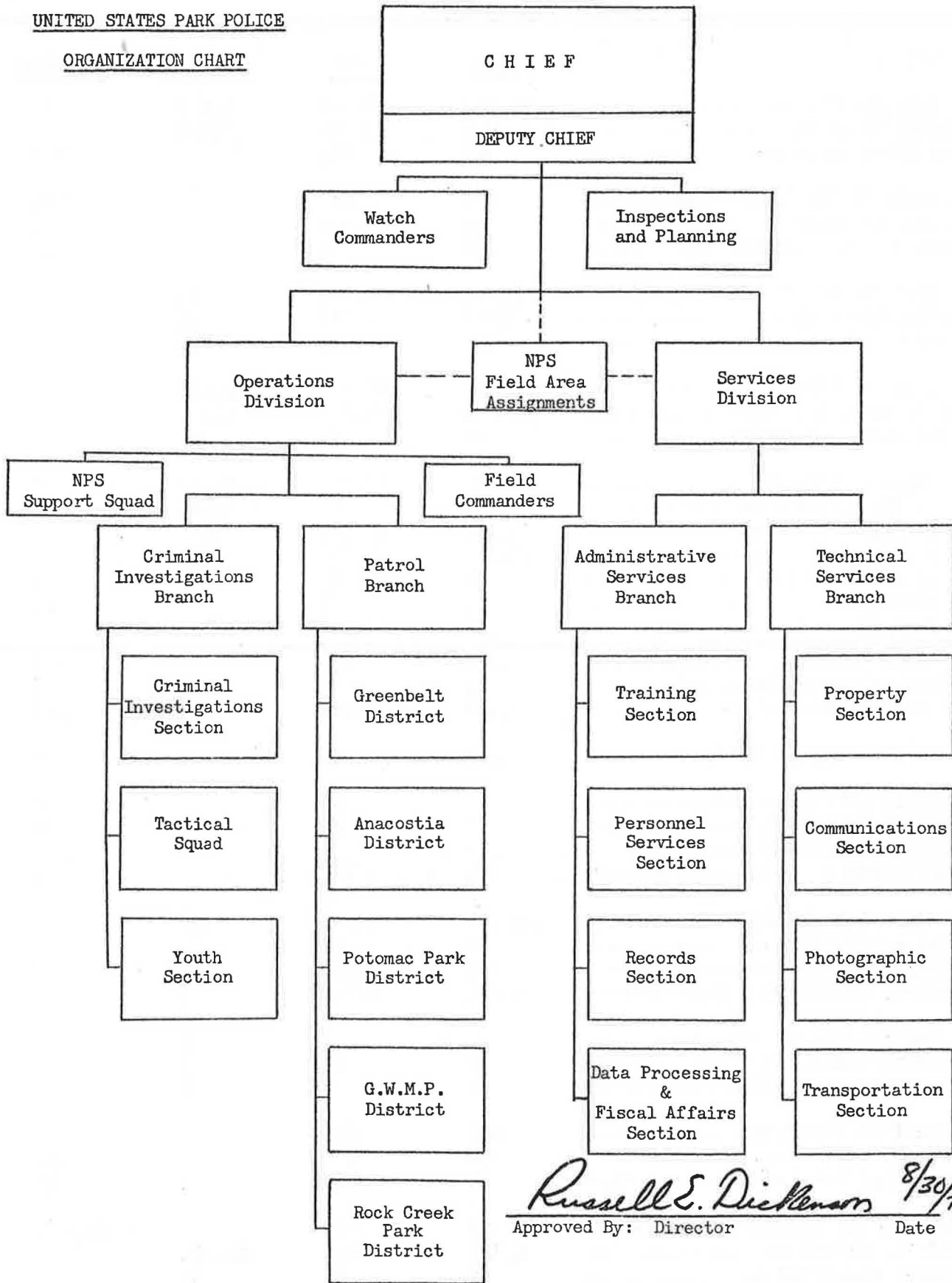

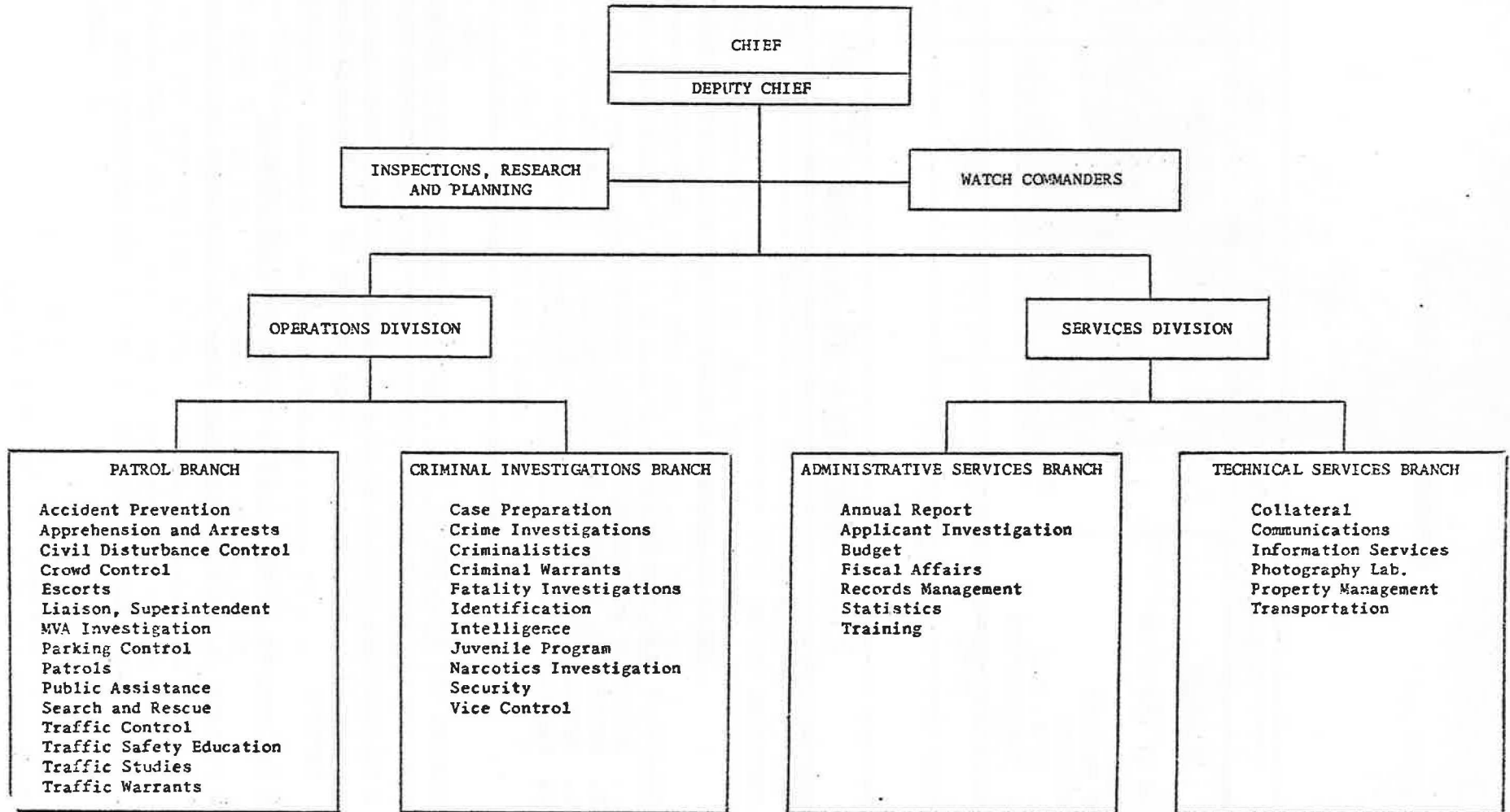
ORGANIZATION CHART

Senate Resolution 119

## In the Senate of the United States

May 10, 1971

*Whereas the Chief of the Metropolitan Police Department of the District of Columbia, Jerry V. Wilson, and the officers and members of the Metropolitan Police force serving under him, together with the officers and members of the United States Park Police force, the Executive Protective Service, the Capitol Police, the United States military personnel, and all others involved in assisting the aforementioned, have continually distinguished themselves by consistent, just, calm, and efficient action under strenuous conditions during the recent demonstrations in the Nation's Capital;*

*Whereas Chief Wilson and the others engaged in law enforcement have handled a difficult and potentially extremely dangerous situation with exemplary professionalism;*

*Whereas the leadership displayed by Chief Wilson has been a primary reason that disorder and damage to public and private property was held to a minimum, and stands as an inspiration to his own men and the men of other units assigned to maintain order; and*

*Whereas the community of the District of Columbia and the Nation as a whole owe Chief Wilson and the others a deep debt of gratitude: Now, therefore, be it*

**Resolved**, *That the sense of the Senate of the United States is, that Chief Jerry V. Wilson and the officers and members of the Metropolitan Police Department, as well as the other officers and members of other units, including military personnel, involved in handling the situation arising out of the aforementioned demonstrations, should be highly commended for their service to the District of Columbia and to the United States of America.*

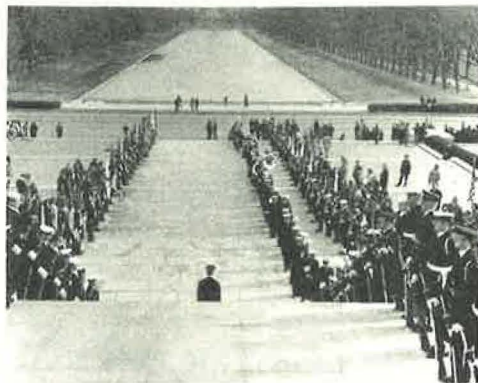
The Park Police provided public assistance and protective services for 3,516 special events and demonstrations which accounted for 57,526 man-hours of our total commitment.

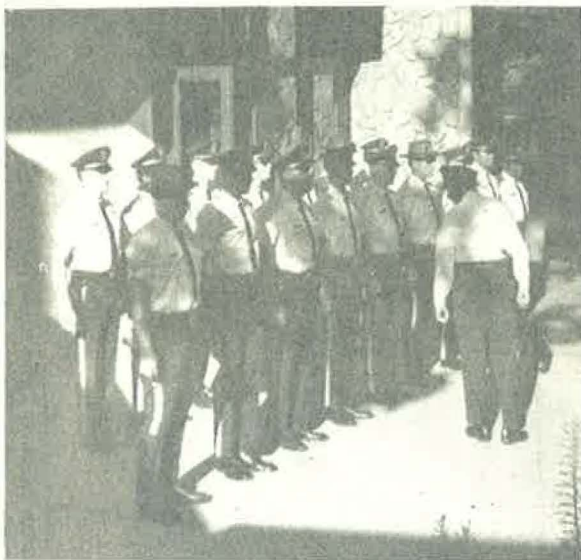

#### Training

In 1971, at the direction of Mr. Hartzog, Director, National Park Service, the Park Police were utilized in an advisory and assistance program to cope with increasingly difficult law enforcement situations in the park system.

Based on a comprehensive study of these law enforcement problems, Mr. Hartzog instituted a Division of Law Enforcement within the Service. At the Regional level, six Park Police lieutenants were assigned as advisors and eleven sergeants served in a similar capacity in specific problem areas during the summer season.

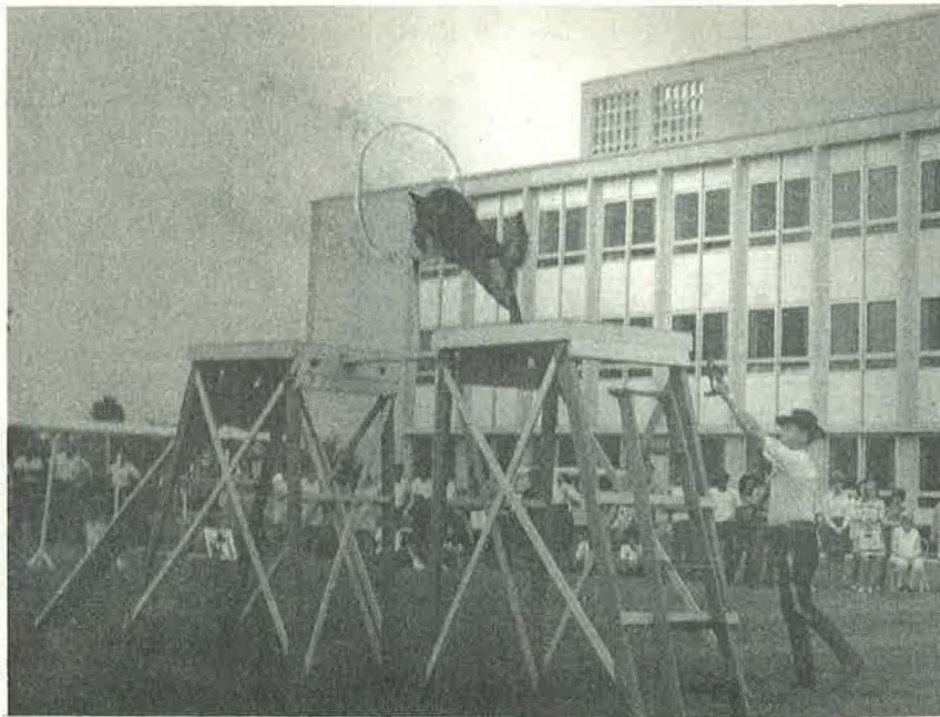

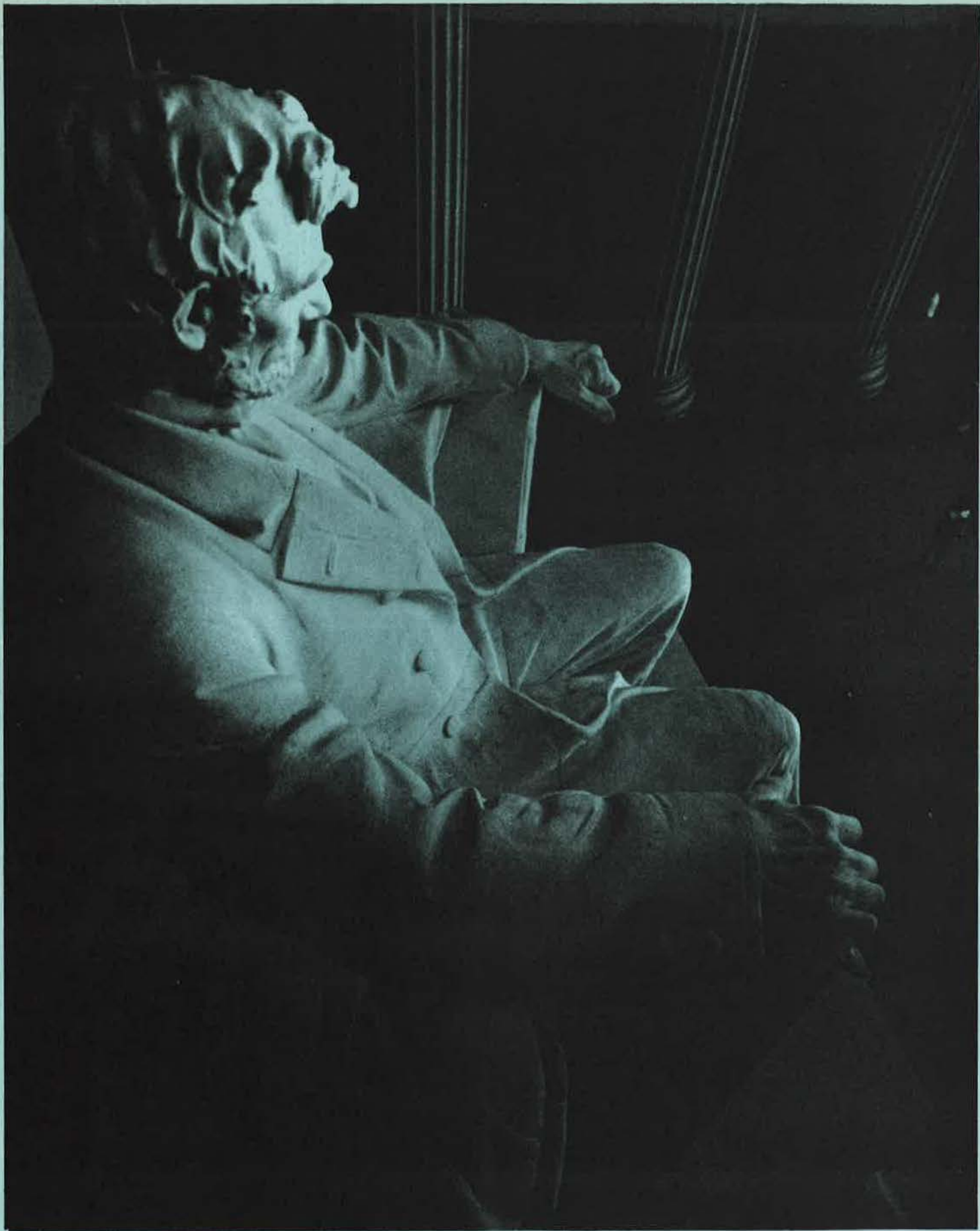
