North of the Klamath River

Where can I get park maps and more information?

www.nps.gov/REDW

Hiouchi Visitor Center and Crescent City Information Center
Jedediah Smith Campground (summer only)

Where can I drive past old-growth redwoods?

3.9 mile section of **HWY 199**. (5.5 miles east of Crescent City / 0.8 miles west of Hiouchi)
5.1 miles of **Howland Hill Road**. (5 miles east of Crescent City) No RVs, or trailers
2.6 mile section of **HWY101**. (7.9 miles south of Crescent City / 9 miles north of Klamath)

Where are the campgrounds in the parks?

Two state park-operated campgrounds are in the north

Mill Creek (summer only) and **Jedediah Smith**

Reservations recommended. www.ReserveCalifornia.com 1800-444-7275

What are some short trails in the redwoods?

Stout Grove (summer footbridges will be installed)

Simpson-Reed Grove. ADA accessible

Where are the lodges, RV parks and restaurants?

There are none in the parks

Local towns offer plenty of these. Klamath, Crescent City and Hiouchi are closest

What about the backcountry?

Free permits are required for over-night stays in any backcountry site

Be prepared to be in bear and mountain-lion country

Where can I take my dog?

Only leashed, service-animals are allowed on park trails

Walker Road is a great place in the old-growth redwoods for any leashed pet

Leashed pets can be on parking lots, developed campgrounds, and beaches with road access

What are other things to do in the north?

Whale, bird, marine-life and sunset watching at Klamath Overlook. No RVs or trailers

Tidepooling at Enderts Beach (requires 2.5 mile walk)

Bike and hike different trails

Kayak, raft or paddle along the Smith River

Learn about Tolowa Dee-ni' and Elk Valley Rancheria culture

What else is there to consider?

Free ranger-led programs are offered

Parking may be limited at the trailheads

When parked, keep valuables out of sight

The southern part of the parks have more miles of trails in old-growth redwoods

Kuchel Visitor Center and Prairie Creek Visitor Center

Where can I drive past old-growth redwoods?

10 miles of the **Newton B Drury Scenic Parkway** (HWY101 exit 765 & exit 753)

3 mile section of **Bald Hills Road**. (3 miles east of Orick) No RVs or trailers

Where are the campgrounds in the parks?

Two state park-operated campgrounds in the south

Elk Praire and **Gold Bluffs Beach**

What are some shorter trails in the redwoods?

Big Tree wayside. ADA accessible

Prairie Creek - Foothills Trail. ADA accessible

Trillium Falls Trail / Elk Meadow. Picnic tables and plenty of parking

Lady Bird Johnson Grove. No RVs or trailers

Lost Man Creek. Trailers not advised

Where are the lodges, RV parks and restaurants?

There are none in the parks, but local towns offer plenty of these

Orick, Klamath, Trinidad, McKinleyville, Arcata and Eureka are close

What about the backcountry?

Free permits are required for over-night stays in any backcountry site

Be prepared to be in bear and mountain-lion country

Where can I take my dog?

Only leashed, service-animals are allowed on park trails

Cal-Barrel Road is a great place in the old-growth redwoods for any leashed pet

Leashed pets can be on parking lots, developed campgrounds, and beaches with road access

What are other things to do in the south?

Day trips to Fern Canyon and Gold Bluffs Beach. No trailers

100+ miles of hiking trails in diverse forests. "Trillium Falls Trail" is great for families

Learn about the Yurok culture

Day hike (permit required) to Tall Trees Grove: Moderate 5-mile round trip

Drive the "Bald Hills Road" to see the high-country prairies. No RVs or trailers

Horse rides, biking and kayaking

What else to consider?

Free ranger-led programs are offered

Parking may be limited at the trailheads

When parked, keep valuables out of sight

In summer, access to Gold Bluffs Beach may be limited due to over-crowding
